Gill Promises Single Agency Meat Control

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 28—(AP) Corrinth Gill, national director of the president's committee for congested production areas, promised the Oregon committee on livestock marketing today to give "every consideration" to its recommendation that meat control be put under a single federal agency.

The livestock men, led by Prof. E. L. Potter, head of the Oregon State college division of agricultural economics, told him the single control would assure adequate meat for both civilians and soldiers and prices for live animals in line with prices of dressed meats, hides, pelts and other by-products.

Some of the questions to be considered are "What is juvenile delinquency? How serious is it? What is the cause? Who are the delinquents? What can communities do to prevent it? What can the state of Oregon do to improve its treatment of children who do become delinquents?"

These students have studied the question of juvenile delinquency since early fall; they have had lectures from authorities in the field, have visited county jails, the state correction home at Woodburn, have talked with probation officers and judges.
