

Allen Funeral Awaits Family

Relatives in Michigan Awaits by Family Of Accident Victim

ALBANY—Funeral services for Ernest R. Allen, 77, who was killed Tuesday by a maddened bull which he was preparing to take to the slaughter house, await word from relatives in the mid-west. The Fisher Funeral home is in charge of the arrangements.

Ernest Allen was born in Ithaca, Mich., April 10, 1867, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Parks Allen, pioneer settlers of central Michigan. He was a member of the first class to be graduated from the Ithaca high school, and later attended Alma college at Alma, Mich.

He married Mario Grover at Alma on October 5, 1893, and they made their home on a farm near Ithaca until March, 1905 when they came to Oregon. They first made their home in Monmouth but in September of that same year moved to their present farm near Tangent. Mr. Allen had been a member of the Methodist church since early boyhood, and for 50 years had been a member of the church. For the past several years he had served as treasurer of Grand Prairie grange.

Surviving are the widow, a daughter, Mrs. Loren C. Campbell, a son, Roland G. Allen, who both reside on farms near by; and three grandsons, Keith J. Allen, a senior in Albany high, who made his home with his grandparents, and Allen Campbell and Kenneth Allen. Surviving also are a brother and two sisters all in Michigan.

ALBANY—Funeral services for Charles Edwin McClain, 68, were held from the United Presbyterian church January 28. Rev. J. O. McDonald officiated. Mr. McClain died in the Albany General hospital January 25. He had been ill for several months.

He was born in Illinois September 6, 1875, and with his parents moved to Nebraska in 1880 and lived there until 1922 where he had since made his home. He was married to Catherine Smith at Paxton, Neb., in 1901. He was a barber by trade, a member of the United Presbyterian church and of the Modern Woodmen lodge.

Non-High School Funds Apportioned

ALBANY—The non-high school board last week authorized the payment of \$15,500 to nine of the high school districts with which the Linn county non-high school board has contracts. However this sum is approximately only about one half of the amount due the districts for the 1943-44 year. It is also somewhat less than half of the total amount of tuition to be paid all districts for the same period.

Lebanon, whose total payments will be the largest of any of the districts, was not included in the amount paid at this time, as that district voted to receive their money quarterly. High schools not having contracts with the non-high board will be paid at the end of the year.

Districts whose payments were authorized Saturday were Albany, \$9000; Corvallis, \$1200; Stayton, \$1000; Scio, \$1200; Shedd, \$700; Halsey, \$500; Brownsville, \$800; Jefferson, \$350; and Mill City, \$250.

Farmers Plan For Postwar

Mt. Angel Warehouse Has More Business, Mortgage Liquidated

MT. ANGEL—Financial reports distributed to the members of the Farmers Union Warehouse at the annual meeting in St. Mary's auditorium, January 27, showed an increase in the volume of business last year, and payment of the balance on the mortgage.

Business in 1943 totaled \$390,295.81. The net savings or patrons' interest added up to \$42,207.69. In addition \$27,055.97 were returned to the community in wages paid to the regular employees and the rush time extra help, which was needed all during the busy season. The Warehouse cleaned and shipped 22,000 sacks of cover crop seed, including peas, vetches and clover.

The directors submitted a postwar building program to the members that would greatly increase the storage capacity and provide for mixing and handling of grain by providing buildings for bulk grain storage and additional grinding and mixing equipment. The cost of this expansion is estimated at between \$40,000 and \$50,000.

Robert Sawyer and Mr. Stanley of the Pacific Supply cooperative were present and spoke on the activities of the co-op of which the Warehouse is a member. They stated that a little more machinery would be made available to the farmers this year but that supplies for chemicals for the making of fertilizers would be shorter than in 1943.

At the election of directors held at the close of the meeting, Dr. A. W. Simons was elected to fill the office of Albert Diehl, who resigned, and Frank Hettwer was named to succeed himself.

Albany Fire Loss, \$11,808

Net Loss to Property Owners Reduced by Insurance Returns

ALBANY—During the year 1943, damage by fire in the Albany community was estimated at \$11,808, according to the report of Fire Chief Don Hayne to the city council. Of the above amount insurance coverage took care of \$10,785, leaving only a net loss to property owners of \$1,023.

According to the fire chief's report, firemen responded to 172 alarms. Of this number 23 proved to be false alarms and 25 others came from outside the city limits. During the year the chief and his aides made 781 inspections of privately owned property and effected the elimination of 105 fire hazards. For the 12-month period 1269 fore permits were issued to Albany residents desiring to burn trash on their premises.

But it was not only fires that the department was called on to attend during the year. The report shows that 25 rescue calls were responded to, there were 161 ambulance calls and two resuscitation attempts.

Three persons lost their lives during the year by drowning, and two firemen suffered injuries in the discharge of their duties. Income from the ambulance for the year totaled \$750.

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Hospital Free Of All Debts

Dallas Institution Has Many Patients In Its 36th Year

DALLAS—The Dallas hospital has broken all past records for the number of patients registered recently.

The hospital had its small beginning in 1908 when the Craven home on Church and Academy streets was rented and operated as a private hospital by Mrs. Charles Gregory. Later it was moved to the Chapman home. The physicians at that time were Dr. B. H. McCallen, Dr. A. L. Bollman, Dr. V. C. Staats and Dr. A. B. Starbuck.

About 1914 with the idea in mind of building a permanent hospital building, a regional board of seven members was formed with F. J. Coad as president; Oscar Hayter, vice-president; Conrad Stafrin, secretary-treasurer; Dr. B. H. McCallen, Dr. Staats, Dr. Bollman and Dr. Starbuck, directors. With funds derived from the sale of stocks and a loan, the first unit of a 16-bed hospital was built.

The hospital was rented and operated for several years by Miss Van Vorhes and Miss Greer, two nurses from the old hospital, and by their successors. A few years ago the regional board took over the management, employing a matron, Miss Eva Wall, and two nurses.

The building of a second unit was made possible through a legacy from the estate of the late Marion Smith, a pioneer, which increased the capacity to a 24-bed hospital. Three years ago a nurses' home was built from a similar financial source, which gave added rooms for hospital use.

The institution is not dividend paying, and is free of debt. The

board is looking into the future for an opportunity to double the capacity of the present hospital and add more equipment. The present board includes Dr. A. B. Starbuck, president; W. L. Soehren, vice-president; Mrs. Eva Moore, secretary-treasurer; Dr. E. B. Bossatti, Dr. Wayne J. Page, Dr. W. L. Pemberton and Henry Savery, directors.

Native of Iowa Dies At Daughter's Home Near Hubbard

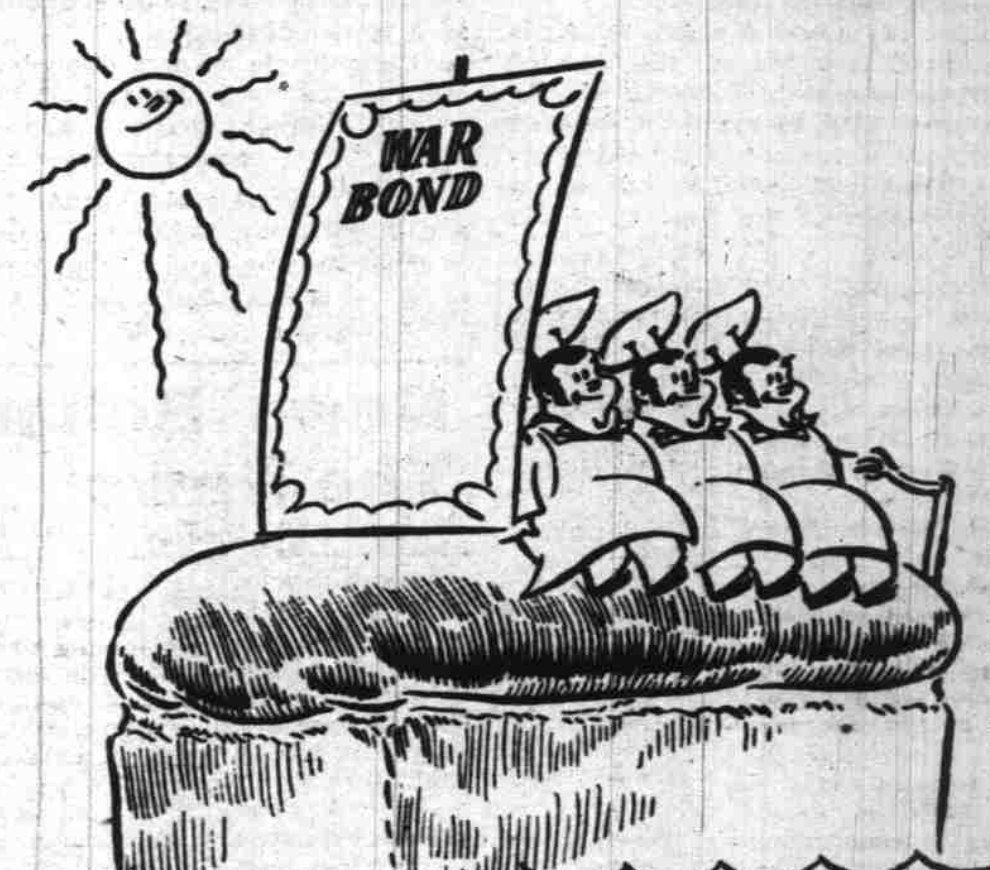
