Joint Trucking Plan to Effect Fuel Saving

More than 75,000 gallons of motor fuel will be saved annually through a joint action plan involving eight heavy haulers of property in Portland on runs within the state of Oregon and to and from the states of Washington and Idaho, it was announced by the office of defense transportation.

Marshall Nauman, Portland district ODT manager of the division of motor transport, said the plan was voluntarily agreed upon by the carriers, approved and ordered into operation by the ODT effective now.

Nauman explained that under the plan, carriers will cooperate with each other to assure that all trucks and trailers will be fully loaded whenever possible. Each member carrier to the agreement will check with the other to obtain full loads.

He pointed out that the plan should increase speed of shipments because of fuller use of available equipment and that the originating carrier would handle billing with the shipper although each member carrier will bill the other carriers for services performed.

Participants to the plan are Jones Hauling company, Columbia Commercial Transport company, St. Johns Motor Express company, Interstate Heavy Hauling company, Western Heavy Hauling company, Willamette Hauling company, Pihl Transfer & Storage company and the Kenneth Poorman company.

State Police Recover 550 Stolen Autos

Oregon state police in 1943 recovered 550 stolen automobiles with a value of \$307,651. Charles P. Pray, superintendent of state police, reported to Gov. Earl Snell here Saturday.

Other stolen property with a value of \$39,085.13 also was recovered.

Traffic arrests aggregated 17,376, with fines of \$126,164.56. There were 349 arrests for drunken driving, with only 11 acquittals. Basic rule violations resulted in 1279 arrests.

Arrests in the general law enforcement division totaled 3225, including 10 for murder and seven for manslaughter. Fines aggregated \$32,817.05.

There were 1052 arrests in the game code division with fines of \$1,233.35 and 42 arrests in the commercial fisheries code division with fines of \$2885.50.

The state troopers investigated 4203 complaints of which 3083 were reported as cleared.

Gas Utilities Revenue Shows Gain

Gas utilities in Oregon reported operating revenues of \$5,964,618.75 for 1942, an increase of \$1,138,779.37 over 1941, it is disclosed in a report issued Saturday by George H. Flagg, public utilities commissioner.

The operating expenses of \$4,634,415.41, increased \$871,857.90, or 23 per cent over 1941. The utility operating income increased from \$1,063,281.87 in 1941 to \$1,330,203.34 in 1942. This was an increase of \$266,921.47 or 25.10 per cent.

All of the gas sold in Oregon is manufactured in this state.

Operations of the Portland Gas and Coke company in 1942 yielded by-products, including briquets, tar, light oil products, pitch, naphthalene, carbon, coke and creosote, with a gross sales value of \$1,616,327.50.

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King Petition Sees Neuner, Flagg Opposed

"The voice is Jacob's voice but the hands are the hands of Esau." Thus spoke Isaac, who was old and blind. In similar confusion, Public Utilities Commissioner George H. Flagg and Attorney General George Neuner insisted Saturday, would the Marion county circuit court find itself if it granted the petition of Ralph King for permission to appear as "amicus curiae" — friend of the court — in the Portland General Electric company's suit against those two state officials.

King is attorney for R. L. Clark and Thomas W. Deitzel, independent trustees of Portland Electric Power company, who originally were parties plaintiff in PGE's suit seeking to prevent the public utilities commissioner from enforcing an order reducing the company's rates. After Circuit Judge George R. Duncan on defendant's motion ordered toe independent trustees stricken as parties to the action, King asked permission to appear as "amicus curiae" on the grounds of his familiarity with "difficult and novel" questions bound to arise in the proceeding.

Delving into the Bible, more particularly Genesis XXVII, 22, for emphasis, the defendants contended in opposition, that King if permitted to appear would be "the friend not of the court but of former parties plaintiff and perhaps of the remaining party plaintiff."

Defendant's objections further contend that King's purposes are hardly consistent with "the duty of an attorney not to encourage the continuance of a suit from any motives of passion or interest," and declaring that "a friend of the court ought never to be a partisan," insist that "what petitioner really asks is leave without a client to stay in the case as a partisan advocate of the relief sought by the plaintiff — all behind the mask of a friend of the court."

Defendants make the further point that King "will remain as free as a bird to communicate at all times to the attorneys for Portland General Electric company the benefit of his advice on these 'difficult and novel questions'."
