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Scio Exceeds Quota \$13,000

First Linn Community Over Top, Continue To Boost Figures

SCIO — Examination for motor vehicle operator's license is scheduled for February 10 at the city hall in Scio.

Fourth war loan in the Scio area is reported in satisfactory condition, according to Waldo A. DeMoy, local chairman. Scio was the first town in Linn county to meet its quota. Quota assigned to Scio and 17 adjacent school districts was \$50,000, which was exceeded by \$13,000 the third day of the loan period. The canvass in Scio was under direct supervision of the local unit Oregon Women's Ambulance corps, of which Mrs. Thea Jones of Albany is first lieutenant and Miss Barbara Fennell of Scio, second.

Czech activity groups of the Scio area are reported making plans for a meeting at the hall February 6.
