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Waste Paper Salvage Drive Opens Today

Though some of the boys and girls have already been extremely busy collecting waste paper, the Marion county campaign for salvaging that essential and scarce material opens officially today. It is the householders' responsibility to gather up the paper and have it ready for the school children to collect, and since they will be around soon, it should be done at once.

Only flat newspapers, flat magazines, old books and catalogues, and cardboard and corrugated cartons smashed flat, are wanted. Householders are advised by the Marion county salvage committee, of which Gardner Knapp is chairman, to bundle newspapers, folded so half a page is showing, in bundles about 18 inches thick. The larger magazines should be bound in bundles about the same thickness; smaller magazines in bundles convenient to handle, thus not so thick.

Floyd Bowers, Salem salvage committee chairman, is arranging for transportation of the paper, after it is collected at the schools, to the loading dock at the Reid Murdoch plant. The junior chamber of commerce is planning to canvass the downtown area for waste paper.

Robert G. Wood of Mountain States Power company has charge of the loading dock at Stayton; the Silverton loading dock is at the civilian defense office, that in Woodburn, is at the Southern Pacific freight depot.

War Effects On Forests To Be Studied

Cooperation in the American Forestry association's appraisal of the war's effect on United States forest resources will be forthcoming from the Oregon board of forestry, State Forester Nels Rogers declared Monday.

Every forested state and county in the nation will be covered in the survey which is expected to require three years. John B. Woods of Portland will be director of the survey in this area.

The principal objective of the appraisal, Rogers said, is to provide basic data - to - date information for intelligent handling of local, state and national post-war forest and land use questions. He said this was necessary if public and industrial interests con-

cerned with the forest land economy are to be given proper consideration in postwar construction programs.

The study unit will be the state with regional consultants operating in each of the forest regions of the nation.

In Oregon the appraisal will include a recapitulation of forest and farm woodland surveys, ownership and management of forests by state, federal and private classification, extent and character of forest drain since 1940, utilization trends with particular attention to wartime uses and peacetime possibilities, permissible post-war forest legislation on protection, perpetuation and utilization of forest resources, and problems of local and federal taxes.

This information, Rogers averred, will make it possible to reach more definite conclusions as to what is necessary in the post-war period to bring the Oregon forests into permanent production.

Essentiality To Be Yardstick, New Tire Ration

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31 — (AP) The essentiality of a motorist's driving is the sole yardstick for measuring eligibility for new passenger car tires under a revision of the tire rationing program announced by the office of price administration.

The change, effective February 1, sets aside the present regulation that only motorists holding gasoline rationing good for driving at least 601 miles a month can qualify for new tires.

The program provides that any driver in a highly essential occupation may apply for a new tire, regardless of the number of miles his ration allows. Local boards, guided by a list of essential occupations, will determine the distribution method.

- Too heavy an oil contributes to hard starting in cold weather... a strain on the battery. Change oil to proper grade if necessary.
- Have the strength of anti-freeze mixture checked frequently to be sure it gives adequate protection during coldest snaps.
- Check all connections in cooling system to prevent loss of anti-freeze.
- Ask your dealer to check specific gravity of your battery. Have it re-charged if advisable.
- Starting, lighting, ignition systems should be gone over during the winter to be sure all connections are clean and tight.
- Both transmission and differential should have proper winter lubricant to protect moving parts in extremely cold weather.
- Steering systems are under abnormal strain during winter because of ice and snow. Have your dealer check the front wheel alignment.
- If it hasn't been done recently, a complete engine tune-up may be advisable for easier starting and greater economy.
- Windshield wipers get extra hard usage in winter. Examine the condition of the blades to be sure they are efficient.
- Remember, slush and snow tends to wash oils and greases away where moving parts are exposed. Thorough lubrication at regular intervals is wise.
