Pineapple Used With Chicken

Here's a chicken casserole that comes from Middle America and uses a few ingredients, not usually put with chicken.

TROPICAL CHICKEN CASSEROLE

- 1 chicken, cut in pieces for frying
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1/4 cup fat
- 2 tomatoes, sliced
- 3 slices pineapple, cut in eighths
- 1/4 cup raisins
- 1/2 cup pineapple liquid
- 1 cup chicken broth
- 4 bananas, sliced
- 1/4 cup blanched almonds, split in half

Wipe chicken. Boil neck, back, wings and giblets to make broth. Mix flour, salt and pepper and coat remaining chicken pieces. Melt fat, fry chicken until brown on all sides. Transfer pieces to casserole. Fry tomatoes and pineapples lightly in remaining fat. Add raisins, pineapple, liquid and chicken broth. Bring to a boil, simmer for five minutes adding more pepper and salt if necessary. Pour over chicken in casserole and allow to stand several hours or overnight. Top with sliced bananas and almonds, brush with milk and bake uncovered in a moderately hot oven (375 degrees) for 45 minutes or until chicken is tender. Serve with plain boiled rice and green peas.

Fruit, Vegetable Combine

Here's an add combination of fruit and vegetable that might bear trying.

CAULIFLOWER AND AVOCADO SALAD

- 1 head cauliflower, boiled and chilled
 - 1 large ripe avocado
 - 2 tablespoons lemon juice
 - 1 1/2 tablespoons grated onion
 - 1 tomato, chopped
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - Black pepper
 - 4 slices bacon
 - Lettuce leaves
- Separate chilled cauliflower carefully in small flowerets. Mash avocado or press through a sieve. Add lemon juice, onion, tomato and seasonings. Fry bacon until crisp. Crumble and add to avocado mixture. Place a flattened lettuce leaf on each plate. Arrange a small circle of cauliflower on each lettuce leaf and pile the avocado mixture in the center. Serves 4 to 6.

Today's Menu

If you are lucky enough to find some of the marshmallows that have recently appeared in the market, try this dessert for a dinner that includes:

- Pear cheese salad
- Tamale pie
- Buttered cabbage
- Vanilla fruit roll

VANILLA WAFFER FRUIT ROLL

- 2 cups rolled vanilla wafers
- 1 cup cubed marshmallows
- 1 cup chopped dates or figs
- 1/2 cup raisins
- 1/2 cup nuts
- 1/2 cup cream
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 teaspoon grated orange rind

Mix ingredients and press into loaf pan lined with waxed paper. Let chill 1 hour or longer. Unmold, cut in thin slices, using knife dipped in cold water to prevent sticking. Serve plain or covered with a thin pudding sauce or creamy hard sauce or a dab of vanilla ice cream or orange sherbet.

Lamb Is Good Choice

There's often a special occasion for an extra special meal (it might only be for the family) when the meal will include meat that's not on the penny-economy list.

In the special occasion meal, planked lamb steaks are impressive in appearance as well as in flavor. The broiled for a planked steak should be of oak, one inch thick. A heat-proof platter is also satisfactory.

Have two steaks from the leg, cut 3/4 to 1 inch thick. Broil or panbroil the steaks on one side until brown. While the meat is cooking have the plank warming in the oven. Season the steaks on the brown side and transfer to plank, brown side down.

Arrange tomato halves or canned peach halves, sprinkled liberally with crumbs dotted with drippings on the plank. Spoon mashed potatoes onto the plank, around the meat and tomatoes, or use a pastry tube if you have one. The potatoes should cover the edge of the plank so the wood will not scorch. If any part of the plank is exposed it should be well greased. Put the plank back in the broiler with the meat about 2 1/2 inches away from the source of heat and broil for 15 minutes. When the tomatoes are brown and the meat is done season meat with salt and pepper and serve. Serves 6.

BROILED LAMB STEAKS

Lamb steaks are a time saver when dinner must be prepared in a hurry. Boiling or panbroiling are two quick methods that are suitable.

A 3/4 inch thickness is about right for broiled lamb steaks. Approximately 8 to 10 minutes to a side are required to have the meat nicely done.

Set the oven regulator for broiling. Place steaks so there is a distance of about two inches between the top of the steaks and the source of heat. If distance must be less, reduce heat so that the steaks will broil at a moderate temperature. When the steaks are browned on one side, season, turn and continue broiling. In turning be careful not to insert a fork into the lean meat. The fork holes will allow the meat juices to run out. The fork may be inserted into the fat, or a "turner" may be used.

Morgenthau Attacks Forced Bond Buying

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31 —(AP) Secretary Morgenthau has issued a stern prohibition against "pressure methods" in the sale of war bonds.

At the same time, the treasury head said Emil E. Plack, chairman of the Sanders (Neb.), county war finance committee, had given him personal assurance that he had "scrapped his ill-advised plan to turn over to selective service and ration boards the names of people in his county who refuse to buy war bonds."

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29 —(AP) President Roosevelt said here that the outpouring of American dollars in the fourth war bond campaign will serve notice that "we Americans are irrevocably united in determination to end this war as quickly as possible in the unconditional surrender of our enemies."

FOOD
Canned Goods — Green stamps U. S. 11 and 2 good through February 29 for processed foods.
Meat, cheese, canned fish and edible fats. Stamps R, S, T and U good through January 28. Stamp V now good.
Sugar — Stamp number 30 in book 4 good for five pounds sugar, expires March 31.
SHOES
Stamp No. 18 book one, good indefinitely. Airplane stamp No. 1 valid now.
GASOLINE
Book A contains No. 10 good through March 31 for three gallons each.
Value of gasoline coupons: A, B1, C1, 3 gallons; B2, C2, R and T, 3 gallons; D, 15 gallons; E, 1 gallon.
FUEL OIL
Period 3 coupons expire February 8. Coupons with gallonage printed on the face valid for amount indicated until expiration date shown on coupon sheet.
TIRES
Cars with C ration books must have tires inspected every 3 months. B books every 4 months. A books every 6 months. Commercial motor vehicles — tire inspections every 3 months or every 3000 miles.
STOVES
Purchase must get certificate at ration board for new stoves.

Fifth Column Jap Activity Is Revealed

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31 —(AP) — "The axis invasion of the United States" began ten years before Pearl Harbor, the Dies committee revealed in a report recommending legislation that "will once and for all stop this foreign penetration of our country by those governments and groups which seek to destroy it."

The report, by the house group charged with investigation of un-American activities, dealt almost exclusively with Japanese activities.

The Japanese fifth column was described as "considerably more intricate and involved than that of any of the other axis coun-

tries," and the "Japanese plot against the United States" was reported to be continuing "both in and out of Japanese relocation centers."

Through their consular officers in this country and their fifth-column groups, the committee said, the Japanese kept in close contact with the operations of the United States fleet and with defense preparations on the west coast, and thousands of Japanese, equipped with cameras, were permitted to take pictures unmolested.
