

Valley Bond Sales Mount

50 Per Cent of Quota Met in Jefferson; Looney Butte Sells

JEFFERSON — David Wied, fourth war bond drive chairman, reports the Jefferson-Marion district has sold \$25,000 in bonds this far in the drive. The district's quota is set for \$50,000. With two more weeks yet in which to purchase bonds, the district should meet its quota.

STAYTON — Issue of fourth war loan bonds amounted to \$62,551 at the Wednesday night's totaling, according to P. V. Reynolds, bank manager. Area quota is \$100,000. Approximately \$48,000 was for "E" bonds.

LOONEY BUTTE — Pupils of the Looney Butte school have progressed steadily toward the goal of \$200 in the fourth war loan drive. Wayne Reeves has charge of recording the sales, which include bond purchases by Karen Keller and Raymond Terhune.

Money taken in will be used for buying war stamps for the school.
