Cooker Gauges Must Be Tested Owners Are Reminded by Agent

Pressure cooker gauges will be tested again this year in the laboratory of the Oregon State college, according to Miss Frances Clinton, Marion county home demonstration agent. These gauges should be tested every two years if the cooker is used

carefully, and every year if the cooker is loaned or used by several operators. Anyone who has a gauge that needs testing may send it to Miss Clinton's office in the old high school building, anytime after next Monday, February 14th. It usually takes a week for the testing and there is a small charge. The home extension program in Marion county for the coming

Jefferson School Holds Memorial

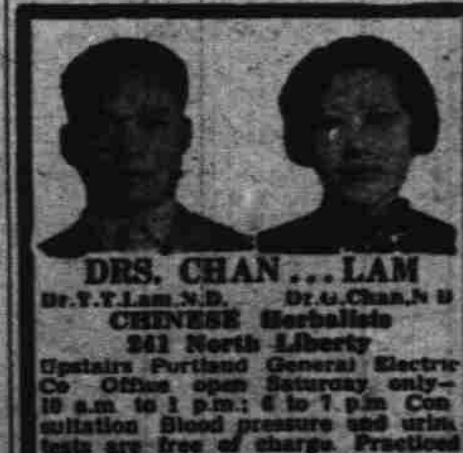
