

Dodds Takes Hunter Mile

BOSTON, Feb. 12-(AP)—Divinity Student Gil Dodds tonight sped to a 4:09.5 Hunter Mile victory and a 30 yard win over Bill Hulse of the New York AC, the American outdoor record-holder, while gaining his first major hometown success before a 12,000 Boston AA track meet audience at Boston Garden.

While reeling off Boston's fastest indoor mile in history, Dodds took command of his four-man field after the first lap and, without being pressed in the slightest degree, ran as if a man-eating tiger was snapping at his heels.

While leading Hulse by about three yards, Dodds clicked off his first quarter in 63.6 and was caught in 2:02.3 and 3:04 at the half and three-quarter distances.

Johnny Fulton, Stanford university junior, reeled off his second consecutive eastern track victory in easy fashion by out-racing Joe Nowicki, University of Rochester marine trainee, by five yards after leading all the way in the featured Lapham "1000."

Well-riden by little Nick Jemas, Olympic Zenith grabbed the lead in the mile and a furlong grind after six furlongs, then drew out into what looked like a safe edge of three lengths. The Bobanet stable's stretch-sprinting Gay Bit cut the lead to one length as the field humped for home, but couldn't overhaul the Helis entry.

State High School Casaba Battle in Muddle

Oregon's high school basketball battle took on a few new twists today, with the defending state champions picking themselves out of the dust and a long-locked Portland league headed by a onetime cellar squad.

Ashland defeated Klamath Falls, defending state champion, in a 36-32 upset Friday which gave new hope to discouraged district 2 schools that had contemplated shipping the playoff to hand the Pelicans the title on a platter.

Salem, which has lost 10 straight games to Astoria in the last three years, broke its losing streak with a 35-32 victory over the Fishermen and made a new bid for the district 4 title.

The Washington Colonials of Portland, who started the season in the basement, trounced Commerce, 35-18, for their ninth consecutive win and undisputed leadership in the league. Rosemead, tied in the lead last week, fell to Benson, 41-38.

Corvallis, powerhouse of the southern half of district 4, kept far in the lead with a 27-18 defeat of Lebanon.

Springfield, leader in the eastern division of district 3, defeated Roseburg, 33-22, in a non-district tilt. University High of Eugene went down to Junction City, 46-39.

In district 7 Newberg swapped Beaverton, 32-21, and Milwaukie edged Central Catholic of Portland, 25-24.

Portland, Ore., Feb. 12-(AP)—William J. Warner, former all-America football player, brother of the famous Glenn "Pop" Warner, and a respected coach in his own right, died here early today after a two-month illness.

Warner, 62, who quit coaching in 1911, was city attorney at Hermiston, Ore., at the time of death. He had practiced law in Hermiston 33 years.

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Players Want No Deferments States Landis

CHICAGO, Feb. 12-(AP)—Ken Kesel, Mountain Landis, commissioner of baseball, announced tonight that club owners in professional baseball would not ask for preferential draft treatment of their players during the war.

The commissioner's statement was occasioned by the exchange of published correspondence between Stephen Early, secretary of President Roosevelt, and J. G. T. Spink of St. Louis, publisher of Sporting News, a weekly paper devoted chiefly to baseball. Spink sought an expression from the White House on the game's future during the war.

"Mr. Spink is not a member of the baseball organization and does not speak for anybody but himself," Landis said, in his statement. "Nobody authorized to speak for professional baseball has requested preferential treatment of any kind for any player. Most emphatically, no such request will be made while we are engaged in this war."
