Scouts to Aid Forestry Plan

Scouting's contribution to the forestry program is clearly demonstrated in a project set for early March and which was discussed at the scoutmasters' round table held at the Argo hotel Friday night under the direction of Robert Lantz, newly named commissioner of the Salem district.

On Saturday, March 4, 30 scouts, two being chosen from each troop in the district, will climb on forestry trucks at the victory center and journey to the Silver Falls burn where each of them will plant 100 trees. The procedure will be repeated on March 18 with another 30 scouts being picked. On each of the Saturdays 4000 trees will be planted, 8000 in all.

It will be the second year such a program has been carried through. Scouts will be interested in how much growth has been attained by trees planted last year. The planting will be in charge of Sam Miller and Lew Amort of the forest service.

Next round table meeting is slated for March 18, featuring an outdoor beanhole session.
