West Salem Accounts for \$52,277 Bonds in Recent Campaign

DALLAS—Polk county has again gone over the top with \$70,859 oversubscribed. The amount of sales was \$753,359.25 and the quota was \$682,500. Sales of E bonds amounted to \$415,584, somewhat in excess of the quota of \$359,800.
