Grain Market Prices Hold Up

CHICAGO, March 2—(AP)—Moderate strength was displayed by grains today as a small amount of buying pushed prices up for gains ranging to more than a cent. Most of the buying came from local traders, but there was some commission house purchasing of rye, and mills took a small amount of wheat shortly after the start. Dealing were not active. Final prices closed at the day's highs. Wheat closed 3/4 higher, May \$1.71 1/2, oats were up 1/4-1/4, May 80¢, rye was ahead 3/4-1/4, May \$1.28 1/2-1.29, and deferred deliveries of barley were 1/4-3/4 higher, July \$1.19 1/2. There was a dearth of any news to encourage strong buying demand in wheat. High protein grain does not attract much interest, but other grades moved readily at maximum quotations.

Special Stocks Attract Buyers

NEW YORK, March 2—(AP)—Buyers again leaned toward specialties in today's market while more or less neglecting the general run of leaders. A number of rails, up at the start, slipped toward the last but liquors, amusements and other assorted favorites closed with gains of fractions to a point or so, a number at peaks for the year or longer. The Associated Press 60-stock average ended with a net advance of .1 of a point at 51.4, which was just 1 under the 1944 top. Transfers totaled 705,850 shares compared with 632,590 Wednesday.
