

Stocks Soar In Fast Session

By BERNARD S. O'HARA NEW YORK, March 13 (AP)—In one of the fastest sessions of the past several months, the stock market today responded to further investment confidence by a push to a new high mark since last July with gains of fractions to more than a point.

While low-priced issues turned over in blocks running to around 20,000 shares, principal bidding centered on pivotal rails, motors, steels and specialties. Peace-rated stocks exhibited strength, but armament issues generally managed to hold their own. The direction was upward from the start and, while a little profit cashing trimmed top figures in the final hour, closing advances were widely distributed.

The Associated Press 60-stock average was up .4 of a point at 53.1, a peak since July 14, 1943. The rail composite was at the highest since October, 1937, and the utilities since November, 1940. Transfers totaled 1,618,920 shares compared with 1,147,720 last Friday.

In the "new high" class were Santa Fe, Southern Pacific, Atlantic Coast Line, Pullman, American Locomotive, General Motors, Chrysler, Braniff Airways, Westinghouse, Du Pont, Johns-Manville, Distillers Corp., Pepsi-Cola and Warner Bros. In front were US Steel, Bethlehem, Consolidated Edison, Montgomery Ward, Anacosta, Texas Co. and Radio Corp.

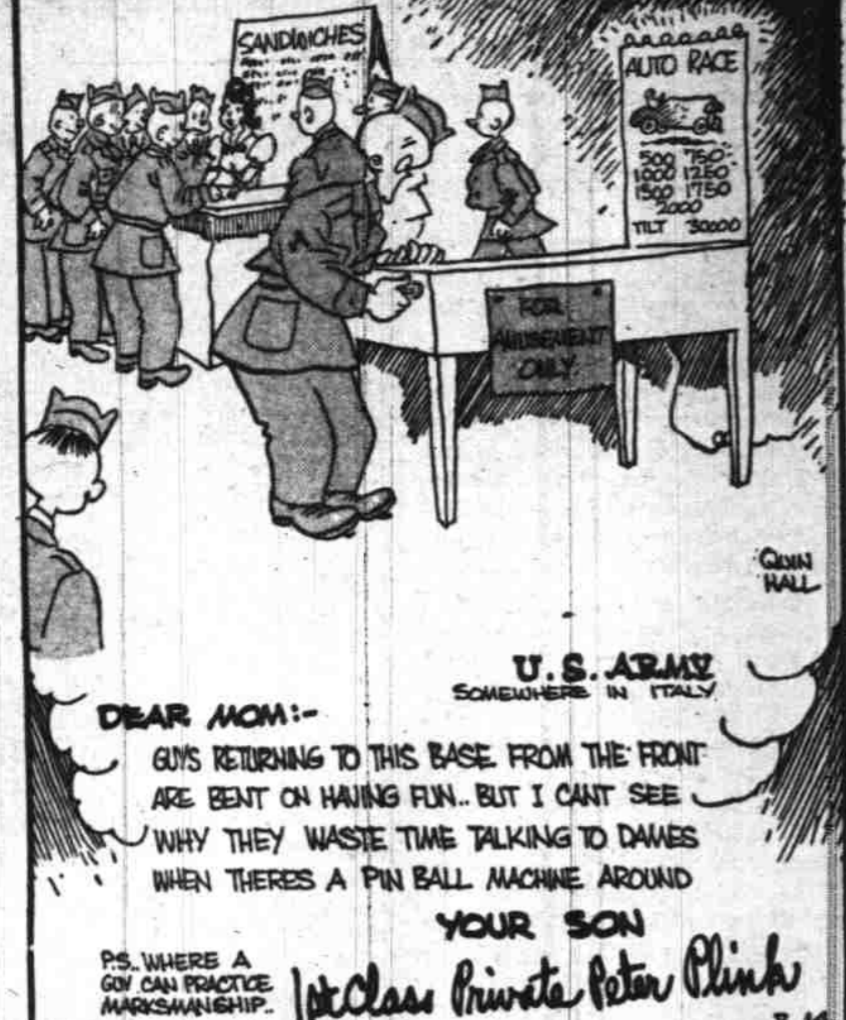

Rye Features Dull Market

By WILLIAM LOCHNER CHICAGO, March 13 (AP)—A firm rye trade stood out today as the feature of an otherwise listless grain market on wheat finished steady and oats and barley were firm with the dark grain.

After a steady opening all grains eased in mid-session, but then recovered, wheat responding slightly to the upturn in rye just before the close and finishing unchanged to 1/4 higher than the previous close, May \$1.71 1/2, July \$1.68 1/4. Rye ended the day with gains of 3/4 to 1 cent, May \$1.29 1/4, oats closed 1/4 up, May 81c, and barley finished with gains of 1/4 to 1 1/2 May \$1.26.

Crop reports continue favorable, but wheat operators paid little attention to routine news and were inclined to let the market drift within a narrow range. The marketward movement of wheat still is liberal and little change is shown in prices at Minneapolis where the grain sells at the ceiling of 3 cents under the permissible maximum, the higher protein offerings showing the discount. A good deal of attention was focused on the small movement of corn from the country and what plans the government may have to improve it.

Home Gardens To Be Topic

The home vegetable garden is deserving of much thought on the part of every gardener at this season of the year. By systematic planning, timely planting and continuous use of land, a garden can be an important factor in food production, according to Ben A. Newell, assistant county agent.

To help individual families in planning for this year's food production, Neil Craig, agricultural instructor at the high school, has several classes planned. These will be carried on informally as instruction and discussion periods.

Planning the garden is more important this season than ever before. Planting time of seeds and plants is a point all should study and learn more about, Newell believes. Also timely planting to avoid loss from frosts and damping off due to cool weather is important. These and many other similar garden problems will come up for discussion in the garden classes. 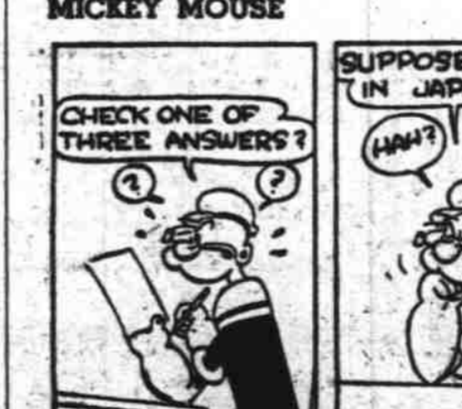

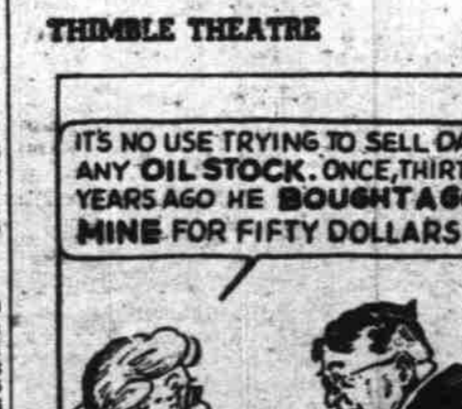
