A preliminary meeting for the school is to be held Monday, when patterns will be fitted ready for actual construction of the garments the other three days. Nine women have registered to make better dresses of rayons and fine cottons. They are Mrs. Verly Scott, Mrs. Floyd Fox, Mrs. Winnie Tate, Mrs. O. W. Humphrey, Mrs. M. M. Gilmore, Mrs. Dolph Heater, Mrs. Byron McElhaney, Mrs. Henry Erickson, who are members of the unit, and Mrs. R. S. Casteel of Salem. Each woman may have a helper who also has the opportunity of receiving the instructions from the school. Among the helpers are to be Mrs. Fern Mikkelsen and Mrs. J. O. Darby. Miss Lane will be assisted in directing the school by Miss Clinton.

Monday, March 20, the Stayton Parent-Teacher association will have Miss Clinton as guest speaker at the night meeting and show an educational film on South America entitled "South of the Border." William Poole is the local president.

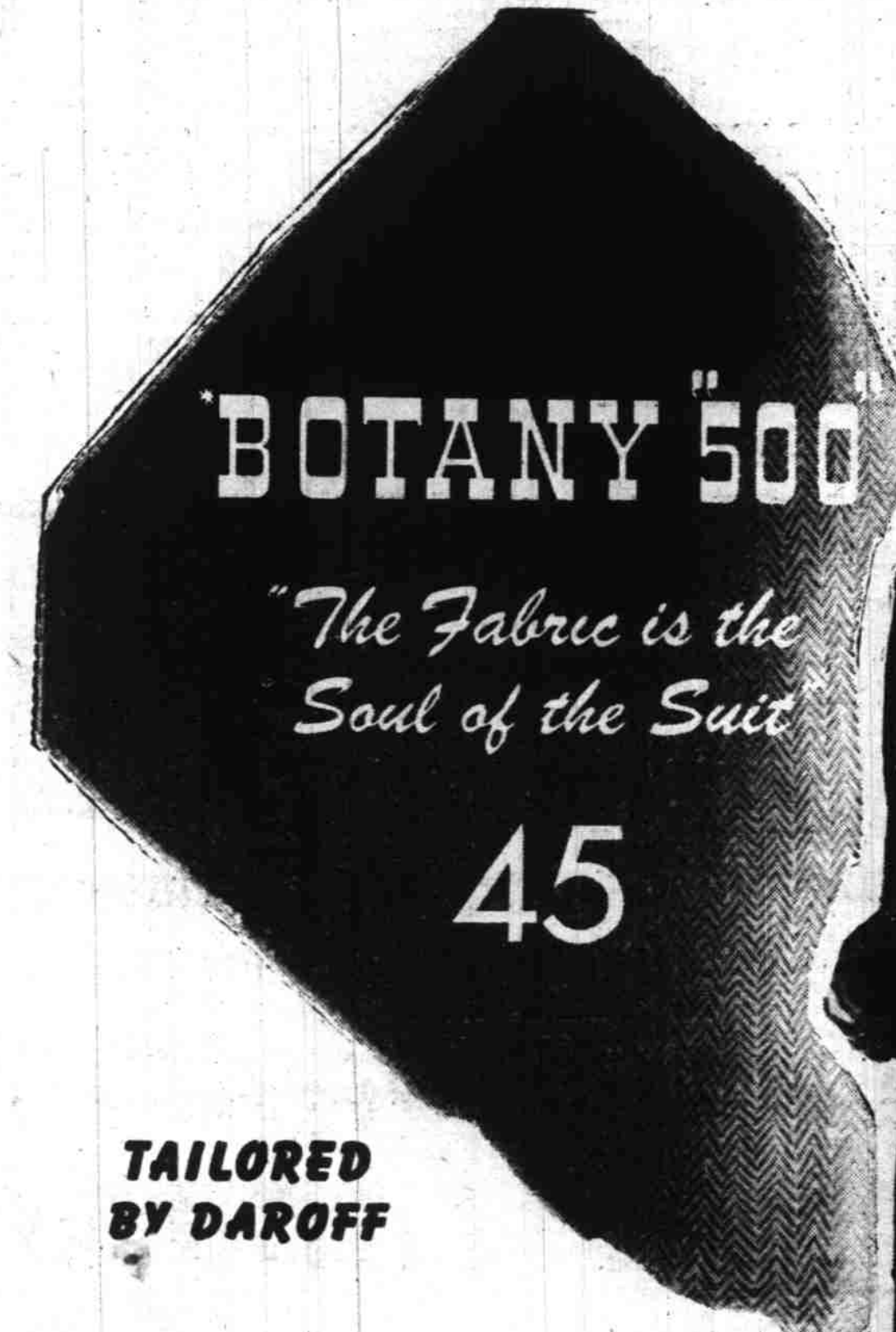
