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Teacher Need Is Discussed

Marion School Leader
Speaks to Students
At Mt. Angel

MT. ANGEL — Mrs. Agnes Booth, county school superintendent, gave the last of a series of vocational talks to students of Mt. Angel normal and academy on Thursday.

Mrs. Booth spoke on teaching as a profession, emphasizing the contribution of the schools and their teachers to the country during the present war and the need of more teachers in the county and state.

Miss Erma Plett, Marion county school nurse, presented the nursing profession to the students as a worthy career both in war and peace times. Rev. Martin W. Doherty, pastor of Sacred Heart parish, Gervais, and author of "The House on Humility Street", published in 1942, gave the talk on the married state, warning the students against hasty marriages.

The religious life was explained by Rev. Martin Pollard, OSB, sub-prior and novice master at St. Benedict's abbey, W. D. Harris, local attorney-at-law, spoke on women's place in the business world and the need of a well-rounded education for women in business.

The series of five talks was sponsored by the normal school and academy student bodies.

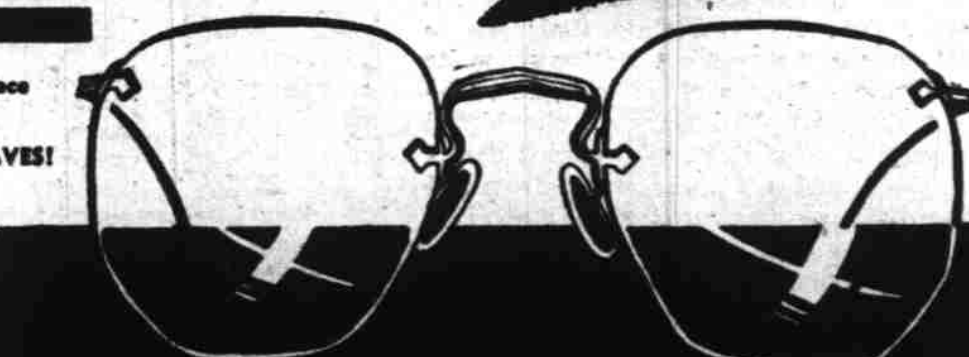
