Not Worth Risking Neck for, Silverton Police Say of Fines

SILVERTON — That reckless driving cases are not given sufficiently heavy fines in the minds of the local police officers was expressed at the Monday night meeting of the city council.

Victor Grossnickle, night officer, voiced the complaint but was

substantiated by Al Amo, chief. Grossnickle cited a particular case of a week ago in which, he said, he had chased a motorcyclist up over west hill at 80 miles an hour and cyclist had even turned off his lights in an effort to escape Grossnickle. But he was finally caught and hailed into court where the judge fined him but \$5. This, said Grossnickle, was not enough "to risk our necks for."

The council agreed that some higher fines should be charged, and Mayor Reber Allen suggested obtaining fine schedules used in other towns and basing the Silverton fines accordingly.

An ordinance was also read and passed on its first two readings repealing the first reading of this new ordinance. Considerable discussion followed the first reading of this new ordinance. Mayor Allen said he hated to see the new building code rescinded but that at present the "machinery" to enforce it was not at hand. Included in the "machinery" was a building inspector. It was thought that likely the ordinance held up some new construction work. According to Attorney Rex Albright the ordinance could not be suspended to permit building to be continued for the time being. Mayor Allen said that when the code was again adopted it might be adopted with some amendments. Councilman Jonas Byberg suggested that contractors be called in to discuss the ordinance before it was passed, but in the opinion of Albright this might defeat the purpose of the ordinance which was to keep contractors in line. Councilman Tom Anderson pointed out that contractors had been given an opportunity to express themselves before the present code was passed as a public hearing had been held, and no contractors attended.

The repealing ordinance will have to be read once again before it becomes effective. A special meeting may be called next week for this purpose.

Councilman E. J. Boesch reported that it had been suggested to him that the local labor union take over the care of the ball park either under lease or by purchase. He added that he had not yet taken the matter up with the union members. The city council suggested that he do this and report back as to the members' reaction. At present the ball park is the property of the city and is managed by a city-appointed athletic commission. Disposal of the park had been discussed.

John Becker, manager of the Farmers' Co-op appeared before the council and asked if he might move his gasoline pumps from his former location on North Water street to his newly acquired business place on Lewis and First streets. Permission was granted.

A petition from Adams street residents was presented asking for light on a pole which is already

in place. This was left for the new manager to look into.

Mayor Reber Allen reported that as yet he had been unable to obtain anyone to serve as dog catcher but that he was still trying.

Reports from the Marion county board of health showed that two samples of water taken during the past month proved to be all right.

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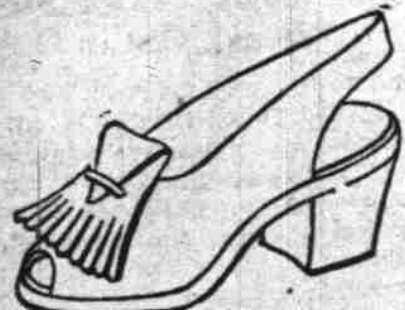
