

New Filings For Primary Come by Mail

A number of additional filings for this year's primary election—placed in the mails Tuesday, the last day for declarations of candidacy—were received at the state department here Wednesday.

Among these was the filing of Clarence Hyde, Eugene, for democratic national committee member from Oregon.

Other related filings: Raymond E. Waters, Portland, for the republican nomination for state representative, 5th district, Multnomah county.

James W. Eckersley, Oswego, for delegate to the democratic national convention.

Charles A. Nutt, Portland, for the republican nomination for state representative, 5th district, Multnomah county.

State elections bureau records show 351 filings for this year's primary election as against approximately 440 at the primary election two years ago. These totals show a marked decrease in the number of candidates for this year when it is considered that there were no filings at the primary election two years ago for president, delegates to the national party conventions or presidential electors.

Certification of this year's primary election candidates to the county clerk will be made by the secretary of state Saturday.

This will be followed by preparing material for the candidates' pamphlet which must be in the mails 10 days before the primary election.

Officials said it would be necessary to print approximately 600,000 of these pamphlets to supply the registered voters.

In Tuesday's list of filings the name of C. J. Shorb, democrat, for representative in congress from the second congressional district erroneously was omitted. Error also was discovered by the secretary of state in the filing of William B. Murray, democrat, of Portland.

It previously was announced that Murray filed for state treasurer, when he actually filed for state senator from the thirteenth district, Multnomah county.

Navy Needs Radio Trainees

To keep pace with the rapidly expanding fleet, the navy has urgent need for men to be trained in the communication branch. Qualifying tests may be taken in the navy recruiting station in the post office building in Salem, according to A. C. Friesen, recruiter-in-charge. All men between the ages of 17 and 50 are eligible to take the examination, and those who qualify will be given a 10 months course in the field of electronics to fit them to serve with the navy ashore and afloat.

The qualifying examination, which is known as the Eddy test, is a time test for which 75 minutes time is allowed. It covers mathematics, general science, shop practice, electricity and radio and has not proved too difficult for the average high school graduate, Friesen states.

Thompson Riches Still Being Found

CHICAGO, April 5—(AP)—The hunt for riches tucked away by Former Mayor William Hale Thompson yielded \$125,000 in securities today — a find that increased to \$1,801,250 the value of assets uncovered since his death.

And the end of the search was not yet in sight.

The latest cache was a safety deposit box in the First National bank. It was crammed with stocks and bonds that had a face value of \$125,000.

The repository was unlocked by James W. Breen, attorney for the Thompson estate, State Treasurer William G. Stratton, and an examiner for the Illinois inheritance tax department. They reported the hoard included a number of utilities stocks, and \$5000 in world war 1 Liberty bonds.
