Temple Veil Torn Asunder From Top to Bottom

Jesus Crucified on Cross in Golgotha, Place Of the Skull; Earthquake Rocks Temple

(This is the fourth of six articles by Robert E. Geiger, AP Features Writer, telling the story of Holy Week as it written by a modern newspaperman.)

JERUSALEM, Nisan 15 A. D. 30—(Friday)—Jesus was crucified today, between two criminals put to death in the same manner, on a cross in Golgotha, the Place of the Skull.

As He died an earthquake shook Jerusalem, so severely that the Temple veil was torn asunder from top to bottom and the bodies of many saints were thrown from their graves.

"Forgive them, Father, for they know not what they do," said Jesus as He looked down upon the men who nailed Him to the cross.

But His tormentors, paying little attention to His last words, divided His garments and each took some of the articles, casting dice for them. Then they sat down and watched while Pontius Pilate had this inscription placed over Jesus' head: "This is Jesus, the King of the Jews."

Spectators reviled Jesus, saying: "Save yourself, if you are God's son. Come down from the cross."

Even one of the crucified robbers mocked Jesus. Then the other dying thief spoke up: "Have you no fear even of God? You are suffering the same punishment as He. And we suffer justly; we are getting what we deserve for our deeds but Jesus has done no harm."

Then he gasped: "Jesus, do not forget me when you come to reign."

"I tell you truly," said Jesus, "You will be in paradise with Me this very day."

About noon it began to get dark and about 3 o'clock Jesus gave a loud cry: "My God, my God, why forsake me?"

One bystander took a sponge, which he soaked in vinegar and put on the end of a stick, to give Him a drink. Another seized a lance and pricked Jesus' side.

Jesus again cried out and died. At the same time, the veil of the Temple was torn and it was almost dark as night. The earth shook and rocks were split.

The usually stern soldiers on the death watch were frightened, awed and trembling.

"This man certainly was the son of God!" they cried.

Beside the cross of Jesus stood His mother and His mother's sis-

ter, Mary, the wife of Clopas, and Mary of Magdala.

Toward evening a secret disciple of Jesus appeared, Joseph of Arimathea, and asked Pilate for His Master's body. Pilate gave him permission to remove it and, accompanied by Nicodemus, they placed it in a tomb. Mary Magdane and the other Mary sat nearby.

Quite upset by the earthquake, and still uncertain about the tenor of the people, the Temple crowd was alert. The Temple couldn't forget Jesus' prediction that He would be resurrected.

Multnomah Democrats Gaining on GOPs

PORTLAND, April 6.—(AP)—The republican party lead over democrats in Multnomah county is being shaved down as registration continues for the May 19 primaries.

Registration by Tuesday night showed 77,211 republicans and 74,908 democrats, a lead of 2,305, compared with a republican lead of about 2800 a month ago.

Highway Officials Plan New Road

State highway department officials returned here Thursday from Klamath Falls where they conferred with members of the Klamath county court and county planning commission in connection with relocation of the state highway through that city.

State Highway Engineer R. H. Baldock said the Klamath county court and planning commission promised to provide some of the rights-of-way without cost, while the remaining rights-of-way required for the improvement will be obtained by the state. The new highway, as planned, will be outside the congested business district.

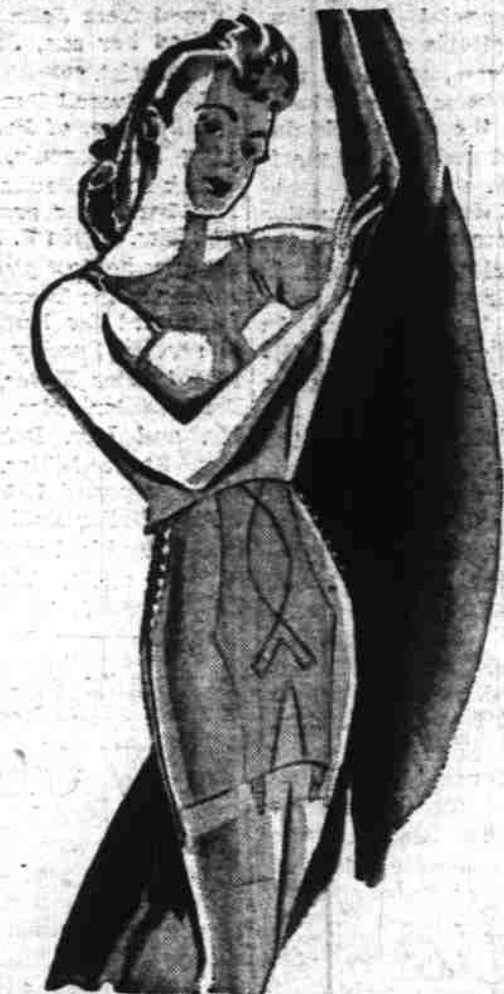
From Klamath Falls the highway goes through Merrill and Lakeview and thence south into
