Camp Silver Creek Schedule Announced; Leaders Chosen

Camp Silver Creek, located in the heart of Silver Creek Falls state park, will be the site of eight summer youth conferences this year, Camp Supervisor C. A. Kells, general secretary of the Salem YMCA, announced this week.

Camps for boys and girls of all ages will be held during the camp season, which opens June 11 and continues every day until August 13.

The schedule: June 11-18—Girls' state camp; June 18-July 2—Strawberry camp; July 9-15—Intermediate boys' camp; July 16-23—Older boys' camp; July 23-30—Presbyterian intermediate camp; July 30-August 6—Presbyterian senior camp; August 6-13—District girls' camp.

Any boy 11 years or older may attend the strawberry camp, while the younger boys' camp is open for boys between the ages of nine and 12, inclusive. Intermediate boys' camp is for those from 10 to 14 years and older boys' camp for those over 12. All girls over eight are invited to the district girls' camp.

The Salem YMCA operates the Silver Creek camp under a special seasonal permit from the National Park Service, and all the protection offered national parks are in effect during summer conferences.

Purpose of these camps, as stated by Kells, is to "help make possible to the largest number of young people, boys and girls, a happy camp experience with a purposeful program designed to enrich personality and make for better citizenship."

Salem Y Boys Work Secretary Harold Davis will be camp director, assisted by Chet Goodman and Vernon Merrick, both of the Salem Y staff. Mrs. Ruby Bergvik will be the director of the girls' camps. Other adult and high school leaders with camping experience will also be on deck to direct the boys.

Schools at which Erickson will hold conferences next week include Lincoln, Roosevelt, Jefferson, Grant and Washington high schools, all of Portland. Suburban schools to be visited are Parkrose, Gresham, Oregon City, West Linn, Tigard and Milwaukie.

The week of April 24 will begin visitations to schools of southwest Washington. Washington state and independent colleges and Oregon independent colleges will be represented at the meetings which will be held at eight schools. Schools from surrounding areas will attend the meetings also.

Prior to the visitations information concerning the colleges have sent to the high schools and the students. A booklet giving information concerning the colleges selection of colleges by the high school student is also being prepared for distribution.

Sample Census to Start In Portland Area

Humphrey, head of the Portland office of the committee for congested production areas, which requested the survey.

The trips will begin Monday and include schools of Portland and the surrounding area. The conferences are planned through an association of independent colleges of Oregon.

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Miss Dickson Heads East For Contest

Darlene Dickson, Willamette senior, will leave today for Washington, D. C. where she will participate in a national discussion group on Pan-American affairs April 11, 12 and 13. On April 13 she will speak on the Town Meeting of the Air.

Miss Dickson won the trip last month when she took first place in the regional inter-American discussion at Stanford university. Contestants were entered in the discussion from six states. Her topic was "Inter-American Trade as a Basis for Permanent Pan-American Cooperation." In addition to the trip, she was awarded \$500 and expenses for study and travel in Mexico this summer. She has studied Spanish for three years and is planning to continue her work at the Middlebury language school in Vermont.

Other contests recently won by Miss Dickson include the old line oratorical contests at Pacific university and one of the divisions of the Linfield college tournament. In February she played the feminine lead in "George Washington Slept Here," presented by the university players. She is student body secretary and a member of Delta Phi sorority.

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Trailblazer Staff Officers Celebrate First Anniversary

CAMP ADAIR, Ore., April 6, 1944 — The general and special staff officers of the 70th infantry division celebrated the first anniversary of their initial get-together which took place at Ft. Leavenworth, Kan., on March 29, 1943, with a buffet supper and dance last Wednesday night at the Camp Adair division officers' club.

During the course of the buffet supper and the subsequent dancing, for which Stg. Matt Carnevale's rumba band played until midnight, memories of the officers and their ladies drifted back over the history of the 70th division and personal incidents connected with it for the past year. Lt. Shelby Dukes, secretary, was in charge of the affair.

They recalled the days at Ft. Leavenworth, the historic jumping-off place of the famous Oregon Trail, where they gathered to meet each other, lay plans for the present division, and attend school until April 24. At that time the officer cadre left to follow—this time by train and automobile—the hallowed trail from Kansas to Oregon to carry on where the pioneers left off and to organize a group to fight and win another but different battle.

Stated for Ft. Lewis, Wash., originally, the officer cadre received new orders that sent them to Camp Adair, and they arrived here on May 3. The enlisted cadre arrived during the following three weeks, and complete plans were laid for activation, reception of fillers and organization of the 70th division.

Nearly all of the original group remained together to see the Trailblazers activated on June 15, witness the reception and absorption of fillers during the latter part of

August, participate in Organization day on September 15, and watch the seasoned soldiers and the recruits grow into a strong fighting infantry division.

Most of those who are here have been upped a grade since the beginning of their trek to Camp Adair to build "Oregon's Own" division at the end of the Oregon Trail. They have effected and seen many changes as training progressed, all a natural process of a growing volatile unit.

The original officer cadre will be minus some of the members they "pioneered" with to Oregon. The following list contains the names of all of the Ft. Leavenworth group, with only four of them missing: Maj. Gen. John E. Dahlquist, Brig. Gen. Robert N. Young, Brig. Gen. Roland F. Shugg and Col. Charles H. Owens.

Also Lt. Col. Elmer J. Willson, Lt. Col. James F. Miller, Maj. Rex R. Roach, who was substituted by Lt. Col. Raymond E. Bell, Lt. Col. Joseph G. Conley, Maj. Theodore C. Metaxis and Maj. Leo H. Silverman.

The special staff included Lt. Col. Leonard C. Sorensen, Maj. John E. Devine, Maj. Daniel F. Munster, Maj. James H. Cowan, Lt. Col. Ellery W. Niles, Lt. Col. Eugene R. Inwood, Lt. Col. Harold D. Following their marriage, Mr. and Mrs. Walker moved to the farm of the late William H. Goltra near Goltra station. They resided there until the death of Mr. Walker three years ago, when Mrs. Walker moved to Albany.

Surviving is one sister, Mrs. D. M. Sturtevant of Los Angeles, Calif., who is on her way to Albany. There are also several nieces and nephews surviving, only one of whom, Ellis Walker, living here.

Grain Market Shows Decline

CHICAGO, April 6.—(P)—Easier price tendencies in all pits characterized trading in grains today, but selling was not heavy and declines were mainly restricted to small fractions. Favorable crop weather and reports that the American government would endeavor to import 20,000,000 bushels of oats from Canada by May 15 were depressing influences.

Activity was on a small scale as traders were not inclined to make new commitments with a holiday tomorrow, Good Friday, and only the short Saturday session intervening before the week end.

At the close wheat was unchanged to 1/4 lower, July \$1.71 1/4, oats were unchanged to 1/4 lower, July 78 1/4, rye was down 1/4, May \$1.31 1/4, and deferred barley contracts were off 1/4-1 cent, July \$1.25 1/4. May barley was bid at \$1.28.
