BARBECUE SAUCE FOR ROAST

2 medium-sized onions
2 tablespoons vinegar
2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce
1 tablespoon salt
¼ teaspoon red pepper
¼ cup catsup
¼ cup water
1 teaspoon chili powder
Shred onions. Mix all ingredients together in heavy skillet. Cover and simmer about 45 minutes. This yields 1 pint of thick barbecue sauce which may be kept in a covered jar in the refrigerator and used as needed. Use to baste roasts or large cuts of meat.

It's in Your Livingroom Every Day

"Everybody makes money but Tchaikowsky," says the radio announcer, as he glibly calls attention to works of the great composer emerging in recent months as popular tunes. But even if modern youth does get its Concerto No. 1 as "Tonight We Love," and Symphony No. 4 as "Holiday for Strings," at least music plays an important part in modern life and youngsters of today have heard the great artists even if only long enough to get across the room and switch the radio over to a swing program.

One of the most awesome changes which have taken place in the past few years, is the overwhelming number of wonderful artists and fine symphonies which are now frequent visitors to even modest homes.

The affluent westerner of the last generation, who made the effort to attend concerts in eastern musical centers, found it possible to make only a few such visits during a lifetime. Yet every week, any radio-owning family can now hear several fine artists and a few of the world's best symphony orchestras thrown in.

We used to make a day of it when we had the rare opportunity to hear great singers on a Portland stage. Now we hear them with a turn of the dial. Increased appreciation of good music, credited no doubt to frequent opportunity to hear it, has stepped up the patronage of our

own local concerts, thus enabling the management to bring great artists to our own town.

But who would have guessed 15 years ago that within a few short days our families could hear Jascha Heifetz play with an orchestra directed by Toscanini, Lily Pons in a group of songs, John Charles Thomas for a half hour and the Chicago symphony for a full hour—all within a few days. And that in between times, artists of only a little less talent would be performing.

Yet these opportunities are all for us this very week end, and not a phenomenally full week end, either. It's just the average list of programs for a period of a few days.

Yes, the ranks of those who appreciate good music are growing greater each year—and all because we now have great opportunity to know and hear.



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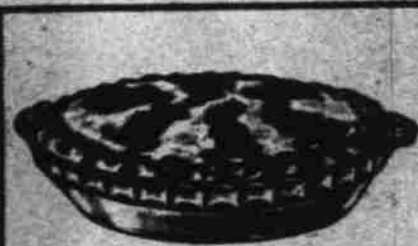
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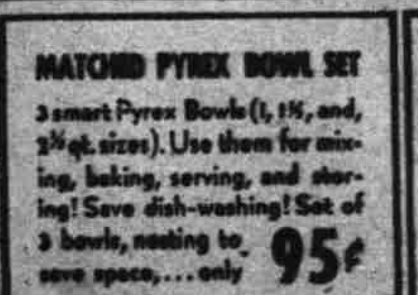
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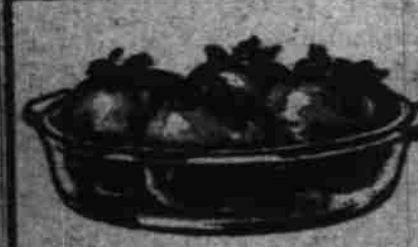
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
