## a pill box somewhere in the Girl Marines Learn Radio

CHERRY POINT, NC. - Training in radio maintenance, a highly technical assignment, has begun England; Floyd Mulcrone for women marines stationed here (Third from top) is a seaman at the largest marine corps air station in the country.

Upon completion of the course they will release the combat marines now assigned the important task of maintaining radio equipment on planes based here and at outlying marine corps air fields. The women learn the use of tools and the use, application, and care of electrical instruments. They are instructed in tuning, installation, operation, and care of various types of aircraft equipment and mobile ground equipment. They are trained as "trouble-


shooters." Before they start the radio maintenance course they attend an eight-week course at the aircraft radio school on the station. Studies include elementary electricity, mathematics, fundamental radio laboratory training, and lactures and special laboratory work on a dozen different types of radio equipment.
