Business Men Hear of Army Life From Visitor

MT. ANGEL — Sgt. Jack Pienett of the army air corps was guest of honor at the Business Men's luncheon at the Mt. Angel hotel Tuesday.

Sgt. Pienett is home on a furlough after 25 months of service at the army air corps base at Lemoore, Calif., and he said it took a lot of praying to get him here, the furlough coming as a surprise. He stated that his training base was in a desolate place about 40 miles from Fresno where the heat two years ago rose to 130 degrees in the shade and the nearest tree ten miles distant. Despite this unpleasantness the base turns out 350 pilots per month. Sgt. Pienett is with the ground force, being first cook for one shift of the thousands of men fed three times a day.
