The county at present is also considering construction of four other bridges, plans hinging on when priorities can be obtained.

Counties Get Tax Dividends

Quarterly apportionment of a part of the tax imposed upon manufacturers and importing distributors of malt or alcoholic beverages, aggregating \$49,762.25, to counties and cities, was announced by Secretary of State Robert S. Farrell, jr. here Wednesday.
Of the total apportionment Marion county will receive \$1591.94; Polk, \$583.03; the city of Portland, \$13,946.36, and Multnomah county, \$2187.21.

Rails Lose Leadership

NEW YORK, April 12 —(AP)—Rails lost their stock market leadership today and as they retreated from early gains key industrial issues followed. Closing losses ranged from fractions to around a point.
Backwardness of Santa Fe from the start may have prevented the rails as a group from extending the previous day's rise. It showed a closing decline of 1%. Johns-Manville dropped 1%, and Du Pont, Western Union "A", Union Carbide, American Can, Oliver Farm, Deere and US Rubber each dipped a point or so. Fractional losses were well distributed among steels, motors, aircrafts and copers. Sinclair Oil was one of the most active shares, reaching a new year's high on a small gain.
The Associated Press 60-stock composite was down .3 of a point at 52.0. Transactions amounted to 718,410 shares against 732,090 yesterday.

Morse, republican candidate for United States senator from Oregon. He was introduced by Bruce Spaulding, democratic candidate for attorney general, who styled Morse "a member of the Oregon bar, farmer and friend."

Late Pressure Drops Grains

CHICAGO, April 12 —(AP)— Selling pressure in the final hour forced all grains lower today after the market had exhibited a steady undertone during most of the session. Rye displayed the most weakness on unconfirmed reports some Canadian rye was being imported into this country. Losses in rye ranged to a cent.

Many traders took a bearish attitude toward the market on the ground that the worst part of the feed shortage had been passed. They based their contention on improving winter wheat prospects and the fact that corn stocks on farms, as reported by the department of agriculture, were higher than expected.

May wheat and oats sold at ceilings and May barley was bid at its maximum throughout the session. At the close wheat was unchanged to 1/4 lower, July \$1.70 1/2, oats were unchanged to 1/4 lower, July 78 1/2, rye was down 1/4-1 cent, May \$1.30, and barley was unchanged to 1/4 lower, July \$1.25.
