Here's a point-thrifty meal suggestion that adds variety to menus. Bologna cornucopias made with table-ready meat and filled with rice make this colorful dinner dish. Form slices of pickle and pimiento loaf or bologna (or any round luncheon meat) into cornucopias. Fasten with a toothpick, leaving a generous opening at the other end to be filled with dressing. To prepare browned rice filling, wash about 1 cup rice. Melt a small amount of fat in a skillet and brown rice. Also brown chopped onion and green pepper. Add water, cover and steam until rice is fluffy and dry. Season to taste. Fill cornucopias, and place in baking pan. Heat in a moderate oven. If desired serve with a brown gravy or tomato sauce.

Here's a recipe that should be good—it's from the lemon growers themselves. Lemon pie is a good recipe to use eggs, a little thing we are being urged to do right now.

- LEMON PIE**
- 1 cup water
  - 1/4 cup sugar
  - 1/4 teaspoon salt
  - 1 teaspoon grated lemon peel
  - 5 tablespoons cornstarch
  - 1/2 cup cold water
  - 3 well beaten egg yolks
  - 1 tablespoon butter
  - 6 tablespoons lemon juice
  - 3 egg whites, beaten until frothy
  - 6 tablespoons sugar

Bring water, sugar, salt and lemon peel to a boil in saucepan on direct heat. Add cornstarch blended with 1/2 cup cold water. Cook over low heat until thickened (about 5 minutes), stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Four part of hot mixture slowly into beaten egg yolks. Return it to rest of hot mixture in saucepan. Stir well. Add butter
