In many cases, states Brown, dealers have refunded directly to customers where prices had been in violation of the ceiling. An example is the Eastern Outfitting company of Portland, which in the past has made refunds totaling \$4,527.20 to 268 purchasers of women's apparel. In addition many Oregon firms have made voluntary payments to the US treasury when the ceiling has been broken.
