Stocks, Bonds Suffer Slump

NEW YORK, April 13 (AP)—Stocks, accompanied by bonds, stumbled today in one of their most substantial relapses on active dealings since early November as selling urgency appeared in the wake of revived nervousness over possibly imminent European war developments.

The Associated Press 60-stock average was off 9 of a point at 50.9, widest slip since November 8. Transfers of 1,193,350 shares compared with 537,720 Monday and were the largest since March 28. It was the broadest market since November, 980 issues appearing. Of these 802 were off, 82 up and 118 unchanged.

Rails were conspicuous on the retreat, having to contend with the ICC order for the roads to show cause by May 8 why the 1942 freight rate boosts should not again be suspended for six months.

Prominent casualties included Santa Fe, Union Pacific, Delaware & Hudson, US Steel, Chrysler, General Motors, Texas Company, Park & Tilford, US Rubber, Sears Roebuck, Deere, Douglas Aircraft, J. C. Penney, Du Pont, Allied Chemical and Philip Morris.

Budget Estimates Must Be In Full

Annual county budget estimates, under a law of the 1943 legislature, must be published by the county courts in full and not summarized, the state supreme court ruled here Tuesday.

The suit was brought by W. T. Vinton, McMinnville attorney as a taxpayer, against the Yamhill county court which sought to publish the budget in summarized form. The supreme court decision, written by Justice Arthur D. Hay, upheld Circuit Judge George R. Duncan.

Another opinion Tuesday: G. W. Manning, executor and trustee of the estate of E. D. Hendricks, appellant, vs. United States National bank of Portland, defendant, Margaret M. Grains Stumble To Low Levels

CHICAGO, April 13 (AP)—Trading in the grain pits faltered at small items of good news today with some wheat and rye contracts in early sales stumbling to the lowest levels in a month.

Reports of better moisture condition in some sections of Kansas and Nebraska caused some traders to revise their figures on the amount of wheat acreage that may be abandoned. There also were reports that seeding of spring wheat was under way in some areas of the Canadian northwest.

May contracts of wheat, barley and oats stuck to the ceiling prices. Deferred wheat contracts which recovered some of an early loss, were 1/4 to 1 1/4 lower, July 1.68 1/4. Rye was 1/4 to 1/2 lower, July 1.28 1/2-1/4. Oats were unchanged to 1/4 lower, July 78 1/4, and barley 1/4 to 1/2 lower, July \$1.24 1/4.

Houses with southwestern conditions sold July wheat and the bread cereal recovered some of its early losses on short covering and some commission house buying.
