Hall Assumes New Air Job

United Air lines Friday announced the appointment of S. V. Hall, western regional vice president, as supervisor of the company's military operations for the air transport command to Alaska and across the Pacific.

Previous to his new appointment, Hall has been supervisor both of the company's commercial operations west of Denver and its military operations across the Pacific. He will be replaced by O. C. Richerson, who will serve as regional manager of western operations, with supervision of all of United's western commercial operations.

United recently reported that it had flown 880 times across the Pacific and had made 2400 other flights in this hemisphere for the air transport command.

State Will Try To Prove It Owns Island

A hearing will be held at The Dalles May 4, when the State of Oregon, through the attorney general's office, will attempt to prove its ownership of an island in the Columbia river between the Umatilla rapids and the Umatilla townsite.

The island was leased by the state land board to the Inland Navigation company in 1943, for a 20 year period, from where the Pendleton air base is supplied with fuel and some other commodities. Following execution of the lease the federal government proclaimed the island a public domain.

Principal question involved, so far as the state is concerned, is whether the island originally was a part of the bed of the Columbia river. More than 20 fuel storage tanks are located on the island.

Representatives of the federal interior department will conduct the hearing.

WU Grad Gets Purple Heart

Lt. A. J. Brassfield, USN, Willamette graduate and holder of the Navy Cross, has been awarded the Purple Heart. Brassfield, a new fixed gunnery officer on the naval air training command staff, tangled with the Japs as a fighter pilot in the Midway and Coral set battles.

A member of the class of 1935 at Willamette, the hero participated in basketball and track and was a history major. Prior to entering the service as an aviation cadet in 1937 he was superintendent of schools in Browning, Mo. He received his wings at Pensacola in 1938 and spent two and a half years as a bomber and fighter pilot aboard the USS Ranger before transferring to the Yorktown, on which he took part in the Coral sea and Midway battles.

United Lines Reinstate Trip

Realizing the need for additional coast-to-coast air service to expedite the transportation of essential wartime passengers, mail and express between the Pacific

northwest and eastern points, the civil aeronautics board has granted United Air Lines authority to reinstate its third transcontinental trip from Portland, which was discontinued after Pearl Harbor when the company turned over approximately half of its fleet to the army.

This new service offers very

good connections for Salem passengers flying to the east coast. United mainliners now leave here at 10:50 a.m., connect with an eastbound plane at Portland at 1:33 a.m. and arrive in New York at 10:26 p.m. the following evening. Returning, mainliners leave New York at 11:45 p.m., arrive in Portland at 7:09 p.m. and Salem at 10:27 p.m.

Y Considers Converting Lot Into Playground

Clearing and conversion of recently acquired property at 251 North Cottage street into a playground is being contemplated by the YMCA. The lot, formerly home of Allie Chamberlain and

owned at the time of purchase by Rollin K. Page, measures 66 by 185 feet in area, and is situated at the rear of the association building. The projected playground will be under supervision of the Y staff, and it is hoped that later on an addition to the present structure can be built.

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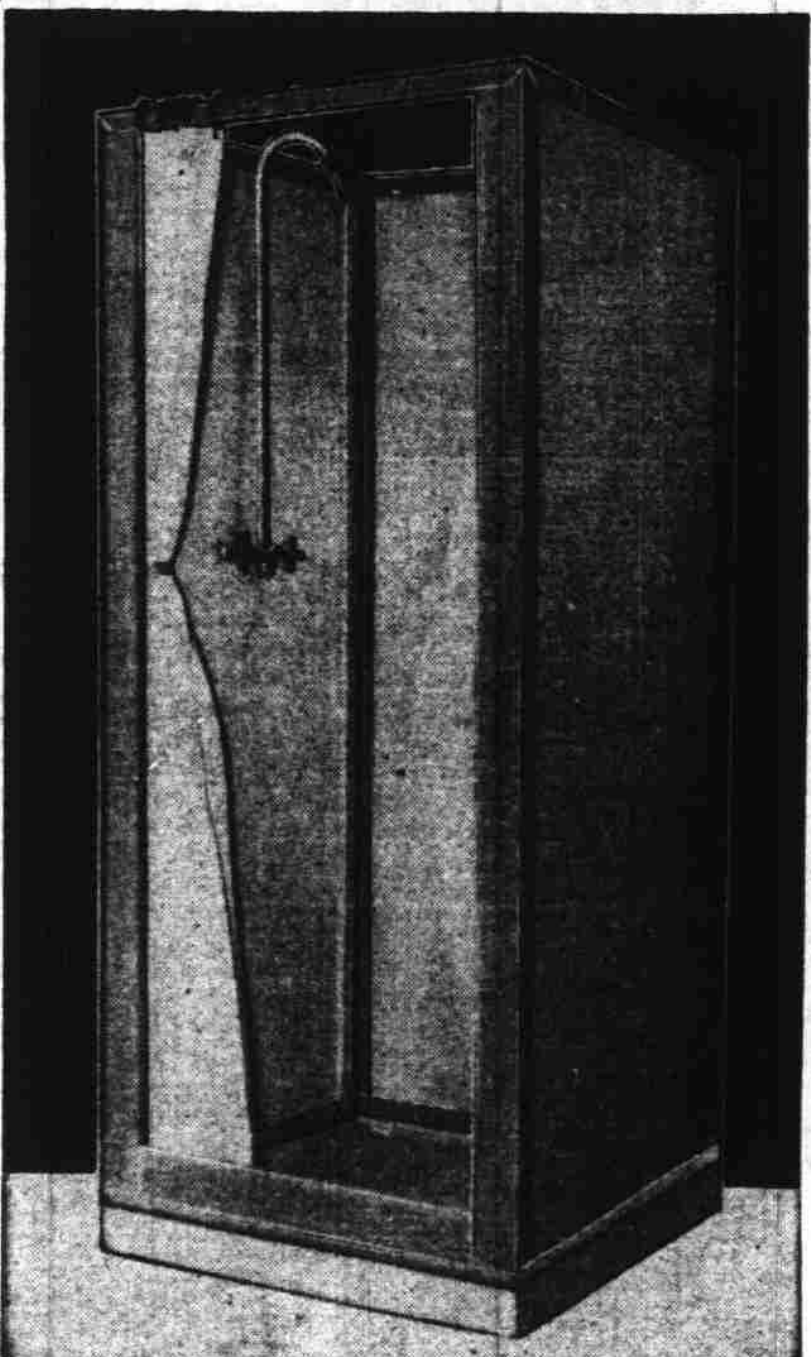

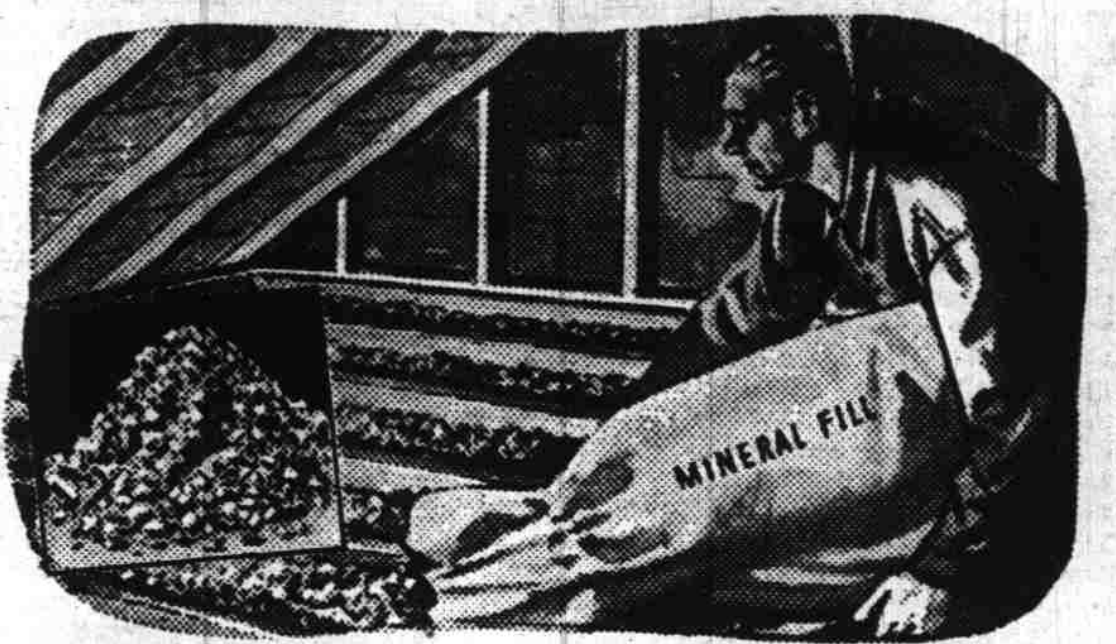

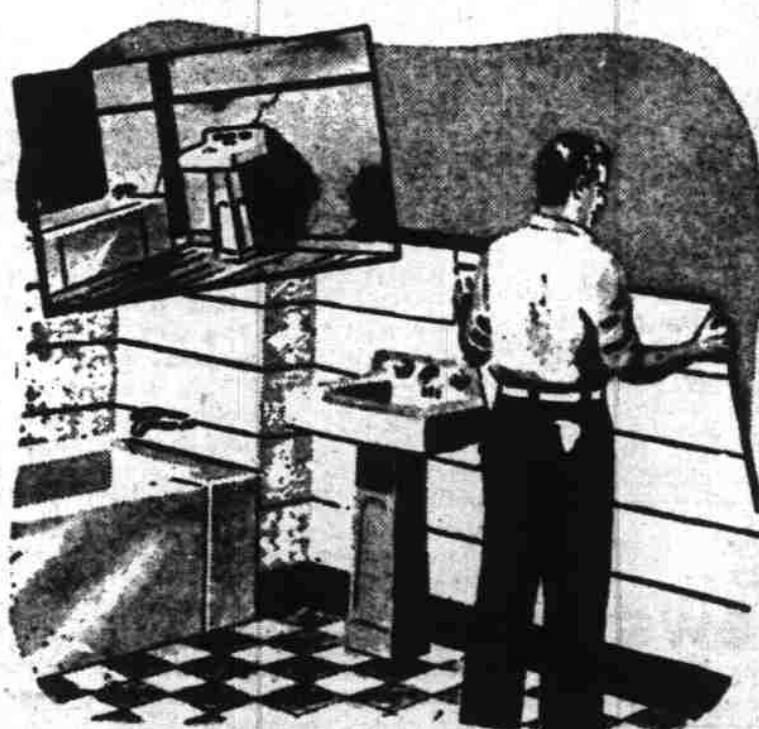
