Woman Injures Hand On Box Factory Saw

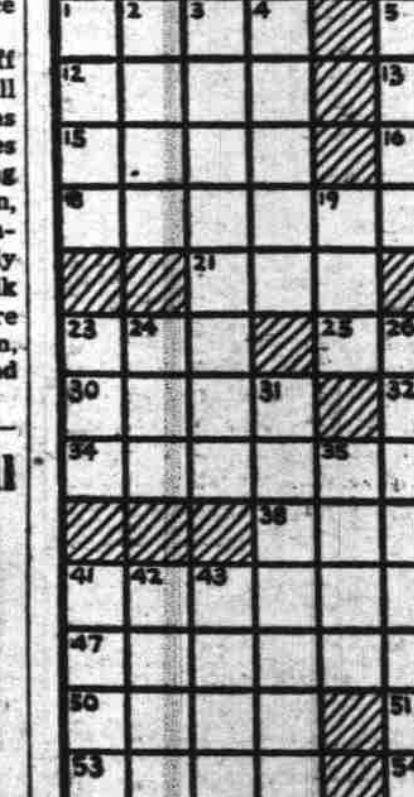

Morse Speaks In Silvertown

Candidate for US Senate Talks at C of C Meeting

SILVERTOWN — The problems of industrial relations, the saving of private enterprise, and international relations, formed the basis of the address by Wayne L. Morse, candidate for the United States senate, at the Silvertown chamber of commerce meeting Thursday night. He was introduced by Glenn Briedwell, chairman of the program committee.

Morse urged that labor and industry "get back to collective bargaining" for only by this, in his opinion, "can we save private industry."

"The national socialist," said Morse, "are just waiting for capital and labor to get into a fight which they cannot settle and have them turn to government for settlement, which will mean government enterprise instead of private enterprise."

He insisted that "we cannot survive any considerable period in which 10 to 15 million walk the streets unemployed. Industry and labor must get together instead of turning to the government for settlement of their individual troubles."

Morse added that America had to watch out for the false economists who "are trying to feed into our minds that we cannot get out of the economic mess we are in without inflation and repudiation." Instead, he urged that "we protect the value of our American dollar. If you don't protect the American dollar, American enterprise cannot survive. If you cheapen it you fill a pocket next to an empty stomach."

In referring to the international situation, he expressed hope that America this time would recognize the importance of sitting down and helping draft a peace treaty "which will take several years to complete. For we must take up problem by problem as they arise." He added that the only type of peace which can be written "must be based on an absolute unconditional surrender."

J. W. Jordan opened the meeting and later suggested that the business meeting be postponed until next Wednesday at 8 p.m. at the chamber of commerce rooms.
