Zimmerman Rites Held

Bearers were David Terhune, John Terhune, Robert Terhune, Clair Haight, Delmer Buchner and Curtis Doty. Interment was in the Jefferson cemetery under the direction of Walker-Howell Funeral home.

Frederick Karl Zimmerman was the son of John Gottlieb and Martha Elizabeth Zimmerman, and was born in Butler county, Pa., December 26, 1875. He came to Jefferson with his parents in 1885, and has made his home here since. He had been actively engaged in farming in this community for many years, and as a young man specialized in the thrashing business. More recently he had been associated with his son on a farm in the Parrish Gap district.

He had been in ill health for several months and died in Corvallis, April 17.

He is survived by one son, John Gilbert Zimmerman of Jefferson; one sister, Mrs. Amanda Haight of Albany, and one brother, William Zimmerman of Colville, Wash.
