

Lebanon Club Sells Its Park

Site Held for Purpose Of City Recreation Is Turned Into Bonds

LEBANON—At a called meeting Wednesday night, the Women's Civic club heard the report of the committee which had been appointed at a previous meeting to negotiate the sale of the 25-acre park site which the club bought in 1911 and which has never been developed according to the plans when the acreage was purchased.

The members at the meeting Wednesday night voted to accept the offer made by Tellus Ward who owns the adjoining tract on Ridgeway Butte. It was further agreed that the money received from the sale of the park site and \$500 from the general fund be transferred from the club's saving account to war bonds.

Brown Rot Hits Peaches

Brown rot blossom blight is a disease of peaches that is doing severe damage in some of the river bottom orchards. Complete control is not probable now that the disease has such a start, but it can be checked to some extent by the application of the regular brown rot sulphur dusts or a spray of six pounds of wettable sulphur to 100 gallons of water, according to Ben A. Newell, assistant county agent. Probably better results will be obtained if the spray can be used and dusts started about three weeks after the spray and repeated every 10 days or two weeks.

Blossom blight first appears in the blossom, causing it to turn brown and die. When weather conditions are damp and warm as they have been for two weeks, the fungus spores spread down the blossom stem and if humid conditions still prevail, it may attack the fruit spur and kill it and work right on down the young branches.

When the infection is severe, the trees may have a scorched appearance as though they had actually been singed.

When first symptoms of blossom blight are noticed, put on a wettable sulphur spray and follow up with sulphur dusts in about two or three weeks. These dusts should be continued at 10 day to two weeks intervals throughout the summer if clean marketable peaches are to be harvested.

As soon as they were turned out on the lawn to feed, Sugar attached herself to them, in a maternal capacity. If a chick wanders a few feet from her watchful eye, she picks it up and returns it to the original formation. If danger threatens, she bristles with active anger. Her evident enjoyment of responsibility for the welfare of the chicks is both helpful and entertaining.

"Sugar" was so named because sugar rationing was occupying public attention at the time this little dog became the property of Virginia and Ray Nelson—aged 12 and 8 years—two years ago. She is now 2½ years old, and has been in the Nelson household for two years. She is of no specific breed, but the proud owners think she has some cocker spaniel characteristics, and her body is slightly reminiscent of a small dachshund. 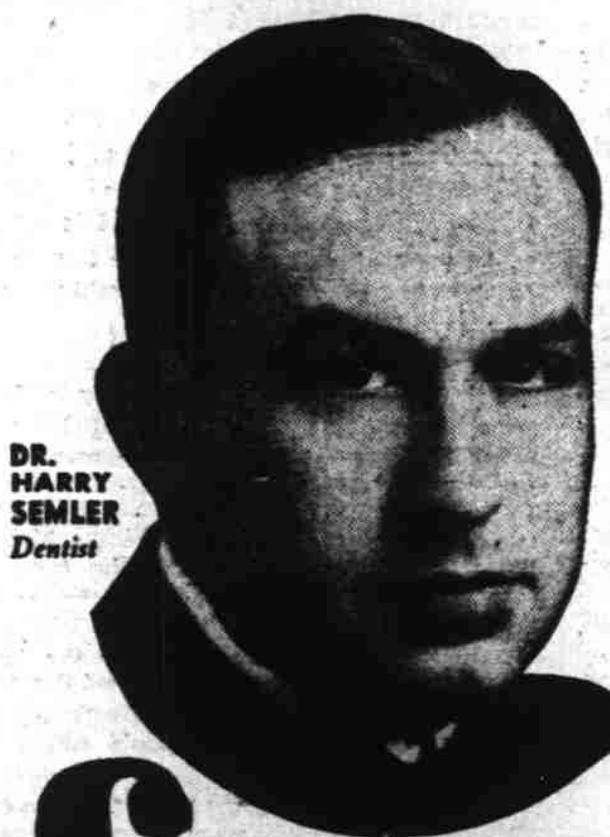
