**Work Begins on County Budget**—County Clerk Mattson sent out forms for preparing budget estimates for fiscal year beginning July 1, 1944, to department heads Monday. Before these are turned over to the budget committee, however, considerable detailed work on coordination and transcription must be done. Funds for the construction of a new courthouse will be the most important matter confronting the budget committee when it convenes on May 23. The county court itself recommends that an annual levy of \$75,000 be set up for construction purposes. In addition to working on budget needs of the various county departments, it is expected that Willamette flood control project will also seek a small increase in operating funds.

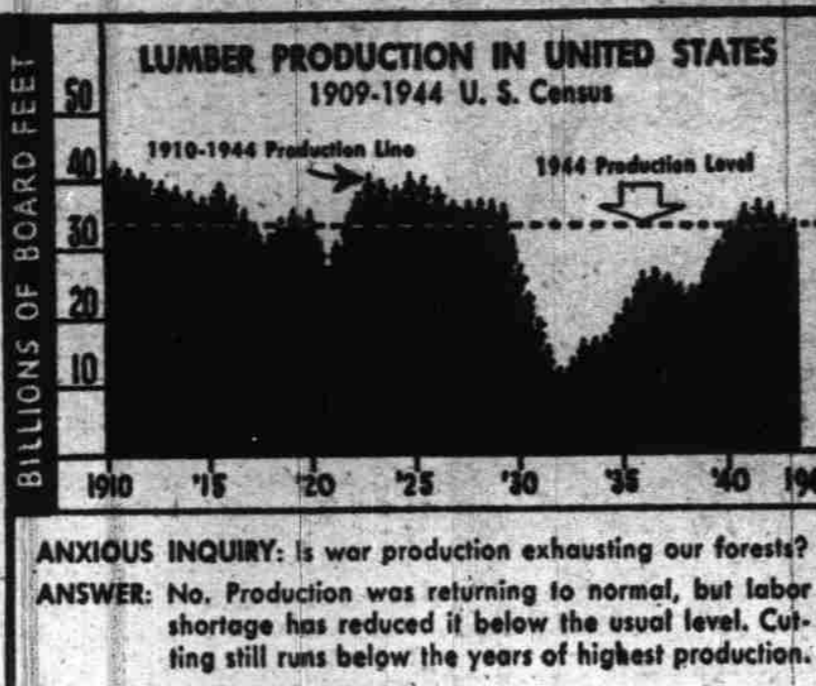

**War Demands Not Exhausting Timber Supply Says Expert**

Prosperous peacetime demands and not wars make the heaviest inroads on the forest resources of our nation, according to E. H. McDaniels, forester with West Coast Lumbermen's association, who has just completed an analysis of bureau of census lumber production figures for the period 1909-1944.

Colonel W. B. Greeley, secretary-manager of the association, in commenting on McDaniels' analysis said: "The bald facts, from census returns, should be convincing that the war has made no excessive demands upon the forests of the United States. It is true that the war has made unusual demands on our quality timber, like airplane and pontoon logs; at the same time wartime advances in wood-using technologies have probably fully made up for the greater inroads upon raw material of high quality.

"The heaviest inroads upon the American forest resources come not from the wars of the last 40 years—but from the periods of active home, farm and industrial building," Col. Greeley continued. "Another period of high demand for lumber for these peacetime requirements will undoubtedly follow this war. This is well illustrated by the production during the years 1923 to 1929."

"There is obvious need for increasing our timber growth in preparation for this period of national need," Col. Greeley stated as he pointed out that the lumber industry recognizes its obligation and is organizing its resources through tree farms and improved industrial forestry to meet the problem headon.

**Moonshine Confiscated At Jennings Lodge**

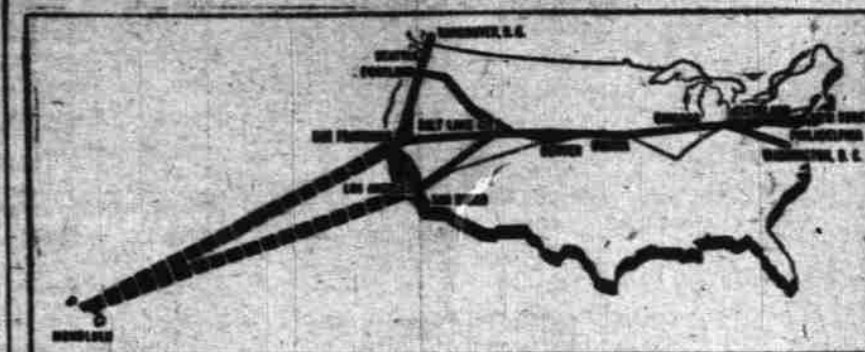
OREGON CITY, May 1.—(AP)—Two Molalla men were arrested and 25 gallons of moonshine whiskey seized at Jennings Lodge, State Policeman C. P. Lindry said today.

Nick Radovich, 56, logger, was charged with illegal possession of liquor, and M. Melvin Bergstrom was charged with illegal manufacture and transportation. It is the first moonshine case in Clackamas county for many years, Lindry said.

### Proposed New Air Routes



Proposed new air routes, here shown in dotted lines, are the two routes for which United Air Lines has petitioned in an application filed with the civil aeronautics board. The map shows how these would connect up with United's existing coast-to-coast and Pacific coast system to provide 23 1/2-hour schedules to Honolulu from points as distant as New York.

### United Lines Request New Hawaii Route

In an application presented to the Civil Aeronautics board yesterday United Air Lines requested permission to operate passenger-mail-express service from the Pacific coast to Hawaii, connecting at San Francisco and Los Angeles with the company's existing coast-to-coast and Pacific coast system.

W. A. Patterson, president of United, in commenting on the application, pointed out that it proposes an extension of the company's domestic service to include a United States territory and, consequently does not come into the category of an international trans-ocean service.

United proposes to operate four-engine transport planes in this service and the estimated post-war flying time from San Francisco and Los Angeles to Honolulu is 11 1/2 hours.

According to the announcement presented to the board, United has gained extensive experience in flying the Pacific for the army air transport command and recorded approximately 880 flights over the ocean between September, 1942, and the end of 1943. Accordingly, it was pointed out, veteran United pilots who have been assigned to the Pacific ocean route would be thoroughly familiar with the type of operations as proposed between the US mainland and Honolulu.

**Holman Requests Rest Home for Camp Adair**

WASHINGTON, May 1.—(AP)—A request by Sen. Rufus Holman (R-Ore.) for a soldiers' home at Camp Adair, Ore., after the war will be given "appropriate consideration," the senator said he had learned today.

If the federal board of hospitalization decides such a facility is needed in Oregon the Camp Adair site will be studied. Government property will be favored for any facilities, the administration said.

### Road Commission To Consider Bid

Bids for three projects, one involving the Lakeview airfield access road in Lake county, will be considered by the state highway commission at a meeting in Portland May 10, R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer, announced Monday.

The other projects:

Furnishing approximately 15,000 cubic yards of crusher rock in stock piles on the Klamath Falls-Lakeview and Fremont highways in Lake county.

Furnishing 6240 cubic yards of crushed gravel and 2440 cubic yards of screened gravel in stock piles on the old Oregon Trail in Umatilla and Union counties.

### Snell Plans to Attend Governors' Convention

Gov. Earl Snell has accepted an invitation to attend the governors' annual convention to be held at Hershey, Pa., late in May. He will give an address on forestry at the convention.

Snell will leave Salem on May 19. Virtually every state will be represented at the convention, Snell said.
