Athena 'Juice' Customers Will Get Refund

Approximately 469 electric customers of the Preston-Shaffer company of Athena, will receive substantial refunds from the company's earnings derived from operations during 1943, following approval of the plan by George Flagg, public utilities commissioner, here Friday.

The company will give back abnormal earnings resulting from the war prosperity.

Active customers whose power demands do not vary from month to month will receive a cash refund of one-half of the monthly billing sent out in March, 1944. Seasonal purchasers who were on the books of the company on March 15, such as canneries, will receive a refund of one-twentieth of their total payment for power. Checks will be sent out during June.

Flagg said other electric concerns are contemplating similar action. The Preston-Shaffer company serves the Weston and Athena districts in Umatilla county.
