NEW YORK, May 6-(AP)—The New York Yankees moved to within a game and a half of the first place St. Louis Browns today by defeating the Boston Red Sox, 5-4, for their sixth straight before 9061 paid admissions. Trailing by two runs in the eighth inning, the Yankees scored three times, climaxed by Bud Metheny's single off Manager Joe Cronin's glove with one out and the bases full.

Metheny's hit was his fourth of the game. Ed Levy, pinch hitting for Pitcher Walter Dubiel, singled to drive in the first two runs of the inning. The Yankees used three pitchers, Rookie Joe Page, Dubiel and Jim Turner, with Dubiel receiving credit for the victory.
