Col. Townsend Speaks at USO **Albany Meet**

Relaxation, recreation, enter-tainment and health are the fields in which the USO serves the enlisted man best, said Col. He advised keeping the perfected USO program simple because while it remains the same the men are always changing and to try to add too many things tends to break the basic program down.
