

# A REAL NEED

In nearly every industry in the U.S. the workers are protected by Social Security or other retirement systems. The ratiroads, steel and oil companies and thousands of other industries provide for pensions for employes upon retirement, and the federal government does likewise for its employes. But there is no such provision for municipal employes. Can there be any doubt as to its need?

The Firemen's Retirement Fund proposed on the city ballot is to be administered by a board of seven members, of which the mayor will be chairman. The city recorder, city treasurer, chief of the fire department, and the chairman of the ways and means committee of the city council shall also be members of the board, and two more members (outside of the city council) will be elected by the members of the fire depart-

This board will have complete charge of the pension fund, and will be governed by laws very similar to those which govern savings banks. The fund will be absolutely separate from all other funds, and cannot be used for any other purpose than that prescribed in the bill.

Tuesday we will tell you how the fund is to be disbursed - under what conditions, how much, and to whom.
