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Beaver Boys State Slated For OSC June 25-July 2

The eighth annual session of Beaver Boys State, sponsored by the American Legion of Oregon, will be held on the campus of Oregon State college, June 25 to July 2 inclusive, according to announcement by John Schenk, of Corvallis, president of Boys State.

This will be the fourth consecutive year that Beaver Boys State has been held at Oregon State college. Lee Botwick of Portland, department chairman of Boys State, will be camp director.

Enrollment will be limited to high school boys 14 to 17 years of age, who will be selected for outstanding qualifications in character, service and leadership, and who will have a serious attitude toward an intensive citizenship program.

The schedule for the 1944 session will call for organization of city, county and state governments, classes in American history, civics, elementary law and geopolitics. There also will be time set aside for military drill and recreation. The principal function of Boys State is the actual practice of constitutional government.

Sponsors of boys, in addition to American Legion posts and auxiliary units, will include service clubs, fraternal and labor organizations and individuals.

United has, in reality, been serving Alaska for years through connections at Seattle and Vancouver, BC, with surface carriers and other airlines," said W. A. Patterson, president. Salem to Get Air Service To Alaska

A move to link Salem with direct air passenger-mail-express flights to Alaska—flights which would place this city only 6 1/2 hours from Juneau and 9 1/4 hours from Anchorage—was taken Saturday by United Air Lines in an application filed with the civil aeronautics board at Washington.

United's petition seeks a certificate to link its existing coast-to-coast and Pacific coast system at Seattle with a new 1600-mile route to Ketchikan, Juneau, Yakutat and Anchorage, Alaska. Juneau is Alaska's capital and Anchorage, a hub of the territory's airline system to the interior.

With the type of four-engine, high-speed equipment which United expects to be operating immediately after the war, company officials say, travel times including stops from Salem to Juneau will be around 6 1/2 hours; to Anchorage, 9 1/4 hours.
