- A pound of beef chuck will go a long way on today's menu. Lettuce and green onion salad
- French dressing
 - Baked beefsteak
 - New potatoes
 - Beans with cream
 - Rhubarb pie
- BAKED BEEFSTEAK
- 1 pound beef chuck
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - Pepper
 - 2 tablespoons fat
 - 1 clove garlic
 - 1 large onion, sliced
 - 1 teaspoon chili powder
 - 2 large tomatoes, chopped
 - Pinch marjoram
 - 1 bay leaf
 - 1 cup stock (or bouillon cube dissolved in boiling water)
- Cut the chuck into pieces about 1/4-inch thick and two inches square, then pound until very thin and circular. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Melt fat in a heavy skillet. Add garlic and half of onion slices. Fry until soft, then stir in chili powder. Add beef slices and brown on both sides, then add remaining half of onion slices and the tomatoes, marjoram, bay leaf and stock. Turn into a casserole and bake, covered, in a moderately slow oven (350 F) for 1 1/2 hours or until tender. Serves 4 to 6.
