Included are Carol (Ted) Greenfield, 21, Silverton's first casualty. He was the son of the late H. Greenfield and Mrs. Greenfield of Silverton. He was serving in the navy and was killed when the Arizona was bombed at Pearl Harbor December 7, 1941.
