

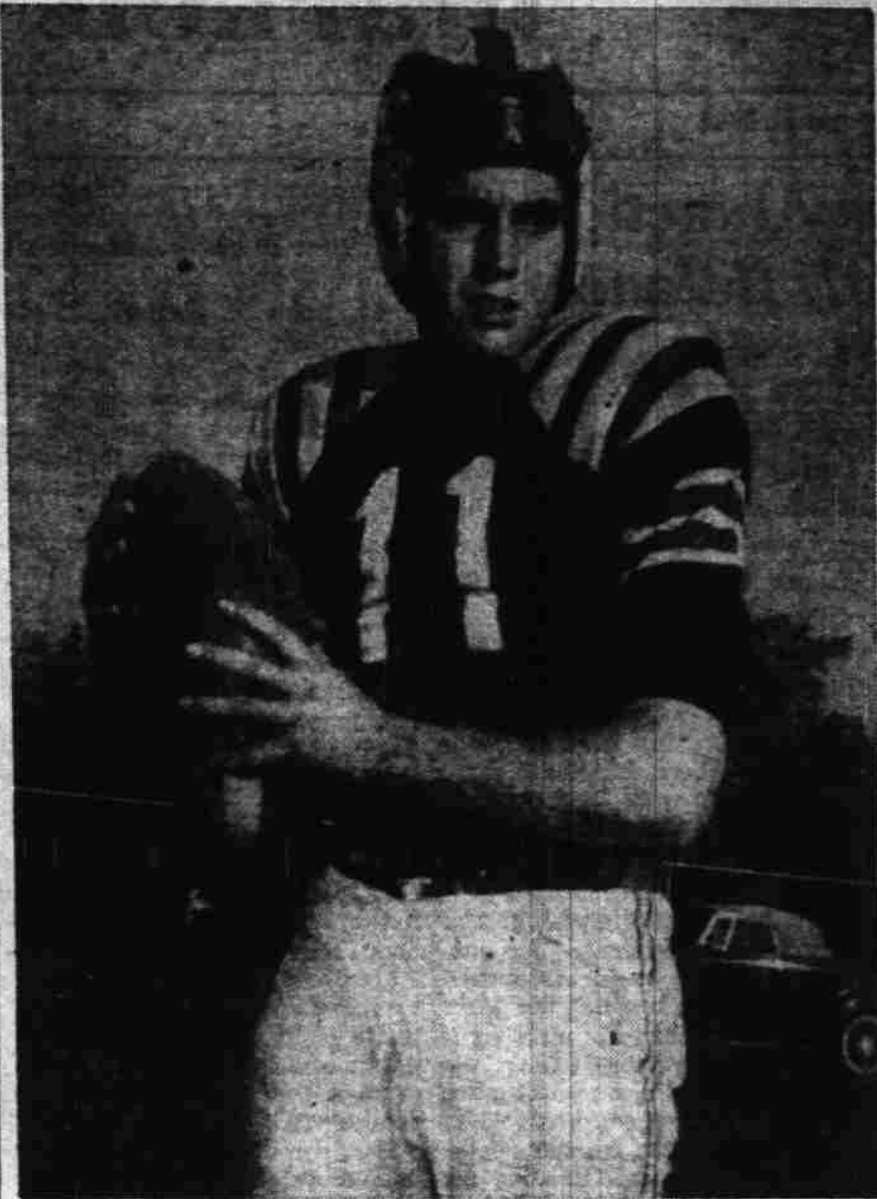
Gala Golfing Meet Sunday

Detroit's Newhouse, Trout Form Potent 'One-Two' Punch

DETROIT, May 31 (AP)—When the Detroit Tigers throw their one-two punch, they deliver a hard left in Southpaw Hal Newhouse and then come up from the floor with a right-hander in Paul "Dizzy" Trout. In Trout and Newhouse, the Tigers have the most effective right-left pitching combination in the American league and one to be reckoned with in the currently tight pennant fight.

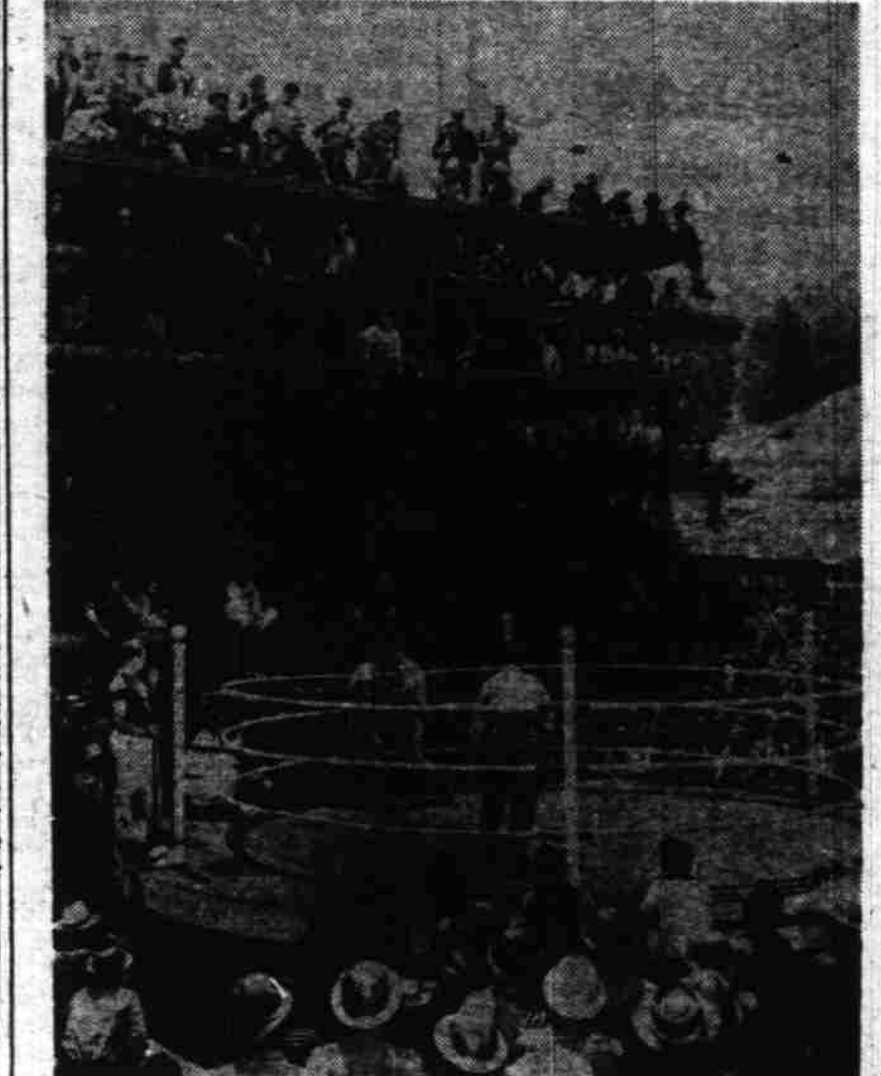
Newhouse's record is seven victories and three defeats, and Trout has won six and lost four. Both Trout and Newhouse are 40 in the draft, and their major league careers are strikingly similar. In four seasons with Detroit, Trout was a notorious non-winner, but last season he became a 20-game winner with a fifth place club. Only Spud Chandler of the Yankees matched that total.

Newhouse's first four seasons in Detroit uniform likewise failed to show a winning record, although he won nine and lost nine in Detroit's 1940 pennant year, his first
