County Health Budget Certified—County Judge Grant Murphy has certified the new county health budget of \$45,074.50 to the federal government, which will match 20% of the amount, approximately \$9,000. The total budget is \$200 higher, but this amount is for maintenance costs and will not be matched by the federal government. The state, county, certain school districts and cities make up the balance of the budget. Items included in the certified budget are the health officer's salary of \$5,100; nursing supervisor, \$2,400; clinic nurse, \$1,980; nurses, \$11,880; clerks, \$6,060; dairy inspector, \$2,280; county sanitarian, \$2,220 and travel allowance \$4,900.

State Heads Worry About Federal Grabs

Encroachment by the federal government upon the sovereign rights and authority of the states featured discussions of the recent annual conference of state governors at Hershey, Penn., Gov. Earl Snell reported here Wednesday following his return to Oregon.

"This is a matter I have discussed for months and I insist that federal regulatory orders and directives involving the states shall be curtailed," Gov. Snell said. "The government already is invading the field of state taxation and looking toward greater control over free enterprise and the daily lives of our people."

Gov. Snell addressed the conference on "The Conservation of our Timber Resources."

"One important resolution," Snell declared, "called upon congress for an early statement with respect to postwar plans and re-conversion so as to enable the state and political subdivisions to proceed with their after-the-war expansion."

School Heads Hear Farrell

The important part educators are playing in the world war and other current issues of national and international scope was stressed by Secretary of State Robert S. Farrell, jr., in an address before the Oregon County School Superintendents association in annual conference here Wednesday.

The convention opened Tuesday and will continue until late Friday. Virtually every county in Oregon is represented.

Other speakers at Wednesday forenoon's session included Mrs. Agnes C. Booth, Salem, association president, and Rex Putnam, state superintendent of public instruction. Putnam said the Oregon schools had fitted their activities into the war emergency and would formulate a worthwhile postwar program.

The afternoon program was featured by a report of the legislative committee and address by Dr. James Millar, field director, board of Christian education, Presbyterian church.

A picnic dinner, sponsored by wives of state educational department officials, followed the afternoon program.

House to Get Road Aid Bill

The new federal highway aid bill under which Oregon would receive approximately \$12,500,000 of government funds annually for road construction during the three years following the close of the war probably will reach the floor of the house not later than June 15, R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer, was advised from Washington, D.C. Wednesday.

The original bill, prior to being amended in committee, would have given Oregon \$19,000,000 a year, including matched funds.

Under the new bill the state Oregon highway commission would receive \$7,370,000 of federal aid funds and \$3,400,000 of forest road funds. The state would match \$580,000 annually.

Baldock said Oregon's post war highway construction program, now being formulated, would be based on the new federal aid bill.

"It is our purpose," Baldock declared, "to get our post war highway construction under way as soon as the war ends."

Smith Successor Not Named Yet

Announcement of a successor to Lloyd Smith, state corporation commissioner who died in Portland early Tuesday, will not be made until after his funeral, executive department attaches here indicated Wednesday.

Gov. Snell refused to comment on the appointment or indicate who he has in mind for the office.

Smith was appointed state corporation commissioner early in the Gov. Charles A. Sprague administration and was reappointed shortly before Sprague retired from office.

Control Board Will Sponsor Loan Drive

The state board of control at a meeting here Wednesday agreed to sponsor the fifth war loan drive, from June 12 to July 8, among state employees.

Figures show that state employees purchased \$450,000 worth of bonds during the fourth war loan drive while their quota was only \$389,000. Officials said the quota for the fifth war loan drive would be slightly less than for the fourth war loan drive because many employees of the state board of higher education are now on a vacation and cannot be contacted.

The board voted to renew the contract with the Mountain States Power company for supplying power to the Oregon State college at 7.8 mills per kilowatt hour and to the Oregon College of Education at Monmouth for 12.27 mills. The contract covers a three year period but may be cancelled one year after the close of the war provided that time expires before the three years is up.

'Trailblazer' Launching Set Saturday

The Trailblazer division of Camp Adair, Oregon will "take over" Swan island on Saturday, June 10, when that yard's 73rd T2-SE-A1 tanker, the SS "Trailblazer" is launched at 11:30 a.m.

A combat team of some 3000 men, accompanied by the 75-piece Trailblazer division band, an artillery unit of 105 MM howitzers, eight of the new M-8 armored cars, plus 24 machine gun-carrying jeeps, will parade through the yard and pass in review before the launching platform.

Sponsor of the ship is Mrs. John E. Dahlquist, wife of Maj.-Gen. Dahlquist, commanding general of the 70th division. She will be attended by Mrs. Peter P. Rodes, wife of Brig.-Gen. Rodes, artillery commander; and Mrs. Charles H. Owens, wife of Col. Owens, chief of staff. Miss JoAnn Godfrey, 10-year-old daughter of Capt. and Mrs. George H. Godfrey will present flowers to the sponsor's party. The invocation will be delivered by Chaplain (Lt.-Col.) Loren T. Jenks, division chaplain.

The ship was originally to be named "Smoky Hill," but the US maritime commission agreed to change the name to "Trailblazer" to honor the 70th division on the anniversary of its first year since activation.

The military aspect of the launching will be accentuated by the parade and review, and all of the members of the 70th division have been invited to attend the launching ceremonies.

Maj.-Gen. Dahlquist will speak during the ceremonies, calling attention to the need for the purchase of war bonds during the fifth war loan campaign, and in between drives. Swan island's goal was established at \$2,700,000.

Mr. A. R. Nieman, assistant general manager of the Swan island yard, will act as master of ceremonies.

War Workers Told Fight Isn't Over

PORTLAND, June 7.—(AP)—State war manpower officials appealed today to workers to remember that "the war isn't over yet."

Numbers of men applying for work clearances preparatory to returning home for peacetime jobs increased so sharply with announcement of the invasion that the US employment services hired six additional interviewers to displace workers from leaving.

"We believe we did stop most of them," said L. C. Stoll, state war manpower commission (WMC) director. "The important thing is to emphasize to them that the things we are building here are not in general for the push against the Germans, but for the push against the Japanese, which will come later."
