Silverton's Millage Is Unchanged

SILVERTON — While Silverton's city budget, adoption of which was recommended Monday night by the budget committee, tops last year's by \$2757.06, tax levies inside the 6 per cent limitation are lessened by \$1290, and millage remains at approximately 22. This will be the peak year in the payment of bond issues, which are fixed. The increase in bond and interest fund in the budget is \$842.06.

The largest increase in the budget is in the general road fund which is estimated at \$4858 for the coming year as against \$3625 a year ago. However, estimated receipts for the road fund for the coming year are \$4610 in comparison to last year's \$1350. The general fund, which takes care of all cost increases including the 20 per cent salary increase, was raised but \$682.

Only two minor changes were recommended by the budget committee following the study of the budget prepared by Manager McCrea, and these were that the committee recommend that the city take advantage of the 6 per cent limitation and that the \$500 still within the limitation be divided equally between the fire department and the library for equipment and books. The budget as adopted by the council was \$42,154.56. Last year's total was \$40,397.50. This gives the fire department a budget allowance of \$1700 and the library a budget allowance of \$1150.

L. F. Tucker served as chairman of the budget committee and C. B. Anderson as secretary. Other members were C. H. Dickerson, I. L. Stewart, R. B. Duncan and Elmer Johnson.

Dufur Man Dies At Lebanon

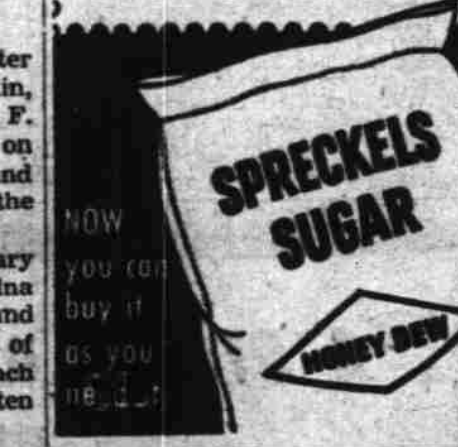
