Food Preservation Demonstrations Held

Agent to Work in Jefferson, Sidney and Keizer Next Week

A series of food preservation demonstrations for Marion county began the past week when Frances Clinton, home demonstration agent, conducted a meeting at Gates Thursday afternoon. Similar demonstrations are to be held at Jefferson, Sidney and Keizer during the coming week.

Miss Clinton will show the latest and best methods in canning fruits, vegetables and meats, both by hot water bath and pressure cooker, also discuss methods of freezing and drying. Canning problems of the individual homemaker will be discussed as well as the new regulations affecting canning equipment.

Wednesday afternoon, June 13, at the Jefferson high school home economics laboratory, Miss Clinton will present the demonstration beginning at 2 o'clock sharp. Mrs. Robert Terhune is making the local arrangements.

Thursday afternoon, June 15, a demonstration will be given in the Sidney community at the home of Mrs. Jake Gilmore, beginning at 1:30. Mrs. William Weidner is assisting in arranging for the meeting.

Friday afternoon, June 16, the Keizer community will have Miss Clinton present the demonstration at the garage hall. Mrs. Fred McCall is making arrangements for the meeting, which is to begin at two o'clock sharp.

These demonstrations are in line with the national program being developed during the month of June to assist homemakers in correct food preservation methods, and open to anyone in the communities desiring to attend them. The series of about 11 or 12 meetings will be held in various parts of the county, principally in those communities where the regular home extension program has not been carried. Meetings have been scheduled already for St. Paul, Aumsville, Turner, Marion, Thomas and Aurora, with dates to be announced later. Other communities will be announced later also. Miss Clinton will broadcast Tuesday morning at 7:15 over the KSLM Farm and Home program, and discuss how cloth is being affected by the war.

Curry Grange Requests New Chetco Road

Loss Estimated at \$125,000; Lumber Co. Worked War Orders

Request of the Curry County Pomona Grange for construction of a new highway extending up the Chetco river from Brookings to a connection with the Redwood highway near Selma, with a branch to Gold Beach, will be discussed by the state highway commission at its next meeting in Portland June 13 and 14. R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer, announced Friday.

Highway department officials indicated that this project would cost approximately \$5,000,000 and probably would have to be deferred for several years pending completion and improvement of more essential roads.

Baldock will report to the commission on the new federal highway bill under which Oregon would receive approximately \$12,500,000 annually for three years following the close of the war. This bill is now in a house committee but was expected to be reported out by June 15.

The highway commission also will consider a proposal to acquire 80 additional acres of land for Silver Creek Falls State park, located 25 miles east of Salem.

The Linn county court will ask the commission to call for bids on behalf of the county for construction of a bridge over the Santiam river near Cascadia.

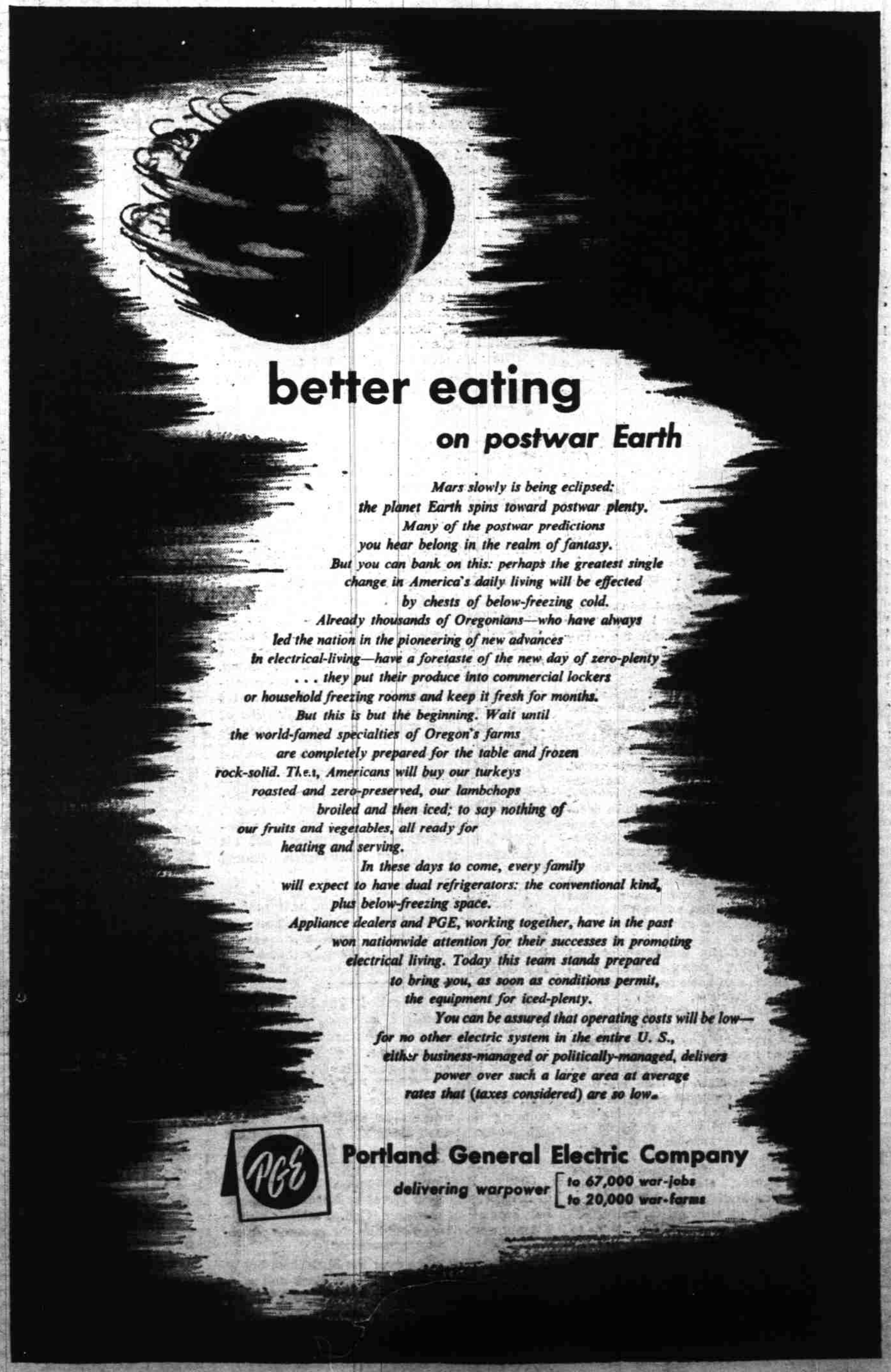
Brush College Picnic Has Baby Show
