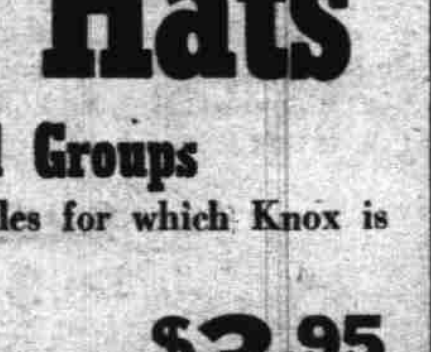
New Officers Installed
