

Allied Chief Sees Gains in Battle Areas

SUPREME HEADQUARTERS ALLIED EXPEDITIONARY FORCE, June 13 (AP)—Supreme Commander Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower expressed satisfaction in a message tonight to his military and naval commanders and to the troops and sailors of the invasion forces with the progress of the week-old battle in Normandy.

"The accomplishments in the first seven days of the campaign have exceeded my brightest hopes," Eisenhower said, adding

that "liberty loving people everywhere would today like to join me in saying: 'I am proud of you.'" The supreme commander's message was written after he had visited the battle area in France yesterday and had talked with his commanders and witnessed the progress of the battle for France. The general's message was addressed to Gen. Sir Bernard L. Montgomery, chief of the allied ground forces; Adm. Sir Bertram H. Ramsey, allied naval commander; Air Chief Marshal Trafford Leigh-Mallory; Lt. Gen. Carl A. Spaatz, commander of the US strategic air force, and to the soldiers, airmen, sailors and merchant sailors and all others of the allied expeditionary force.

GI Bill Up To FDR; No Opposition

WASHINGTON, June 13 (AP)—With the unanimous backing of congress, the "G. I. bill of rights"—an overall war veterans' benefits measure—went to the White House today for President Roosevelt's approval.

A 379 to 0 record vote in the house completed action on the compromise approved unanimously yesterday by the senate. A senate-house committee had compromised differences between the two branches on the big bill estimated to cost between \$3,000,000,000 and \$4,500,000,000,000.

As it left Capitol Hill after almost three months of consideration, the bill provided for government-financed education, government-guaranteed loans, job-finding assistance, hospitalization, and unemployment compensation for veterans of the present war.

Under its provisions, any veteran whose education was interrupted by his war service may resume schooling after his discharge, provided he has served 390 days or longer. The government will pay not more than \$500 annually for tuition and fees in addition to \$50 monthly subsistence allowance if there are no dependents and \$75 where the veteran has dependents.

To help veterans purchase homes, farms or small businesses, the legislation provides for government-guaranteed loans by private or public lending agencies at not more than four per cent interest, repayable in 20 years, with the veterans' administration absorbing the interest charges for the first year. The government guarantee may not exceed 50 per cent of the principal of a loan and no guarantee may exceed \$2,000.

The unemployment section guarantees to a veteran weekly payments of \$20 for not more than 52 weeks during the first two years after discharge.

Eight Trials Set For Mid-July Term

Four men will be tried on four different charges in eight separate trials in mid-July. Trial dates were set by Judge E. M. Page Tuesday after pleas of not guilty. Verl C. Taylor is up for trial July 10 on a charge of assault with intent to kill while armed with dangerous weapon. The grand jury brought in an indictment charging assault on H. O. White last May 18. Through his attorney, Taylor filed written notice that he would introduce evidence indicating temporary insanity.

Henry Wampole Casebeer, Alva Lee Casey and Charles Casey are involved in overlapping cases involving the alleged theft of household goods, and receiving and concealing stolen property. Orville Charles Casey is to be tried July 13 and Alva Lee Casey on July 14 on one charge. On another, Casebeer will be tried July 18, with separate trials of Orville Charles Casey and Alva Lee Casey following thereafter. And on a third charge, Casebeer's second trial will be held later.

Logger Crushed By Runaway Grader

MARSHFIELD, June 13 (AP)—A 50-year-old logger jumped from his runaway grader yesterday only to be crushed beneath the wheels of the machine.

Paul Berryman lost control of the grader while working at the Fort Orford Cedar company logging camp on Upper Sixes river. He has no known relatives.

Canning Sugar to Remain Available

PORTLAND, June 13 (AP)—Ration boards were swamped today with householders applying for canning sugar in the belief that the 20-pound allotment would not be issued after Friday.

Office of price administration (OPA) officials said the full allotment would still be granted during the second period which begins Friday.

Tompkins, Gill To Keep Jobs With Grange

GRANTS PASS, June 13 (AP)—Morton Tompkins, state grange master, was due today to head the grange for another term.

The Dayton man was the only person nominated for grange-master by the convention this morning. Elmer McClure, Clackamas county, was nominated for overseer; Mrs. G. W. Thiessen, Clackamas, lecturer; and Bertha J. Beck, Multnomah, treasurer.

Ray W. Gill, Multnomah, is nominee for position no. 1 on the executive committee; and Peter Zimmerman, Yamhill, for position no. 2.

The only contest, to be decided in elections tonight, lies in position no. 3, with three nominees: Henry Gustafson, Coos county; Minnie McFarland, Morrow, and Allen Wheeler, Lane.

Hood River, Multnomah and Baker counties proposed their locales as sites for the 1945 state grange convention. The invitations, tentative pending developments in war conditions, were given to the executive committee, which will decide upon the meeting place.

The legislative interim committee urged repeal at the next legislature of the law making possible a 75 per cent reduction in the state 1943 income tax levy. Defeat of the sales tax proposal was asked by the committee, which also recommended support of the Burks wine bill, requiring all fortified wines and liquors be sold only through state-operated liquor stores.

The committee urged the grange to take a strong stand for a liberal postwar fund to be taken out of the state income tax surplus.

PORTLAND, June 13 (AP)—Glimpses of wartime Portland: Two wounded veterans, one minus a leg, the other shot up badly by shrapnel, were enjoying their first leave pass since returning from the battlefield. They went to a restaurant, Thomas Michos, manager, struck up a conversation. He said his brother lost a foot while fighting for Greece against the Germans and Italians.

"I would like to treat you to steak dinners," he offered. The veterans accepted. As they ate, Michos asked their names.

"Sgt. Joseph Martin, of Watervliet, N.Y."

"Sgt. M. L. Waltham, San Francisco."

When they stepped to the cashier's desk to thank Michos for the dinners, he handed them each a check for \$50.

Said Michos later: "I thought the checks might come in handy for the boys for spending money."

Naturalized Citizen's Right to Criticize Upheld

WASHINGTON, June 13 (AP)—A naturalized citizen has as much

right as a native-born American to criticize public men and measures and to express "silly or even sinister-sounding views," the supreme court ruled today at its final session of the term.

The unanimous opinion, delivered by Justice Frankfurter, reversed the cancellation of citizenship of a German-born citizen who had written in his diary that Hitler's speeches were "wonderful," and allegedly had rejoiced at the Nazi capture of Dunkerque, criticized President Roosevelt's speeches and expressed anti-semitic views.
