Silvertown War Loan Drive Off to Slow, Steady Start

SILVERTON — Things were moving rather slowly in the Fifth War Loan drive at Silvertown on opening day Monday, officials reported with only \$1866.25 purchased at the local bank and post office during the day. The town's quota is \$300,000 and James Clough is chairman. Other drive figures were not available Tuesday morning.

The actual canvass has not yet got underway here, it was said, but bond sales' officials had hoped that individual purchasers would have been more plentiful on opening day, they stated. This is reported to be one of the "quietest" opening days in any of the local drives so far.

However, five downtown campaign booths will be opened before the close of the week, it was said Tuesday. The J. C. Penney Co. opened a booth Monday and this will be manned by members of the American Legion auxiliary. The store's quota of sales to make is \$2400 figured on the basis that each salesperson in the store is responsible for selling \$300.

A booth will be opened at the Bloch Electric store on Water street and will be cared for by members of the Lions auxiliary. It will be open from 2 to 6 each day, beginning Wednesday, and until 9 o'clock Saturday night.
