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Teacher Lack More Serious

Filling teaching positions in the Oregon schools next fall, provided the war continues, will be more serious than at the start of the school year now closed in most school districts, state educational department officials declared Wednesday.

In order to attract out-of-state teachers and teachers who have retired from the classrooms, the 1943 legislative act authorizing issuance of emergency teachers' certificates will be continued another year. Several hundred teachers qualified under this law prior to the opening of school last September.

"There is no reason to assume that school conditions will improve this year," Rex Putnam, state superintendent of public instruction, averred.

Many teachers now serving under emergency certificates will attend summer school this year in order to meet the requirements of the Oregon school laws in operation prior to the issuance of emergency certificates.

A number of smaller school districts consolidated last year because of the teacher shortage and other mergers are expected during the current summer, Putnam said.

Hudson Assumes New State Duties Here

Maurice Hudson, appointed state corporation commissioner here Tuesday to succeed the late Lloyd Smith assumed his new duties here Wednesday.

Hudson said there would be no immediate changes in his office staff. The new corporation commissioner is an attorney and has been prominent in legal and fraternal circles in Oregon for many years.

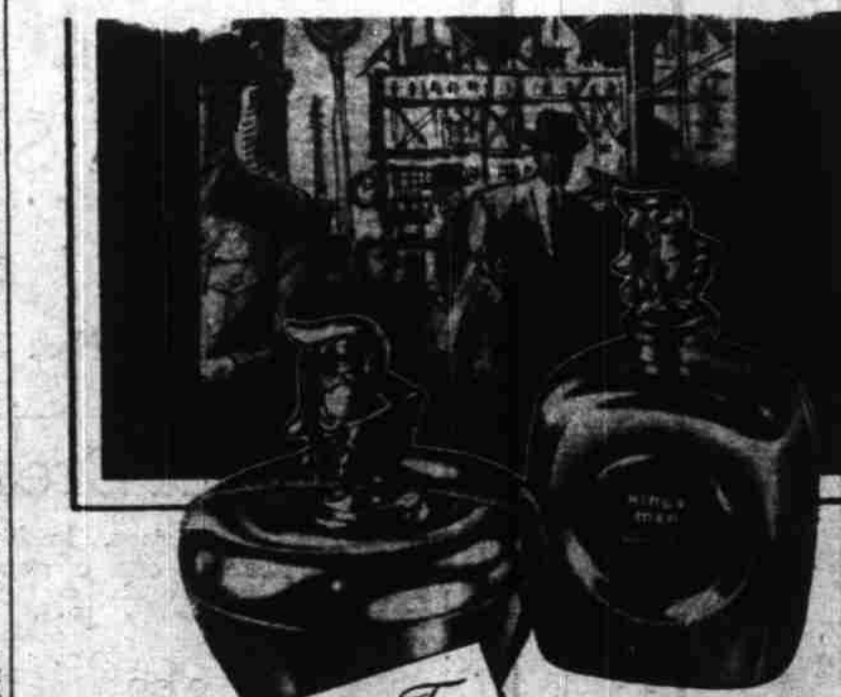
