ALBANY—Mrs. Frank N. Wood, 76, died in the Albany General hospital June 13, as the result of heart trouble. Mrs. Wood died just two days before she would have held her 76th birthday. Funeral services were held from the Fortmiller funeral home Friday afternoon, June 16. Concluding services were at the Salem Mausoleum. Dr. D. V. Poling of Corvallis conducted the services.

Elizabeth Isom was born June 15, 1868, on the donation land claim of her parents, John and Elizabeth Isom, in the Plainview neighborhood. She was married to Frank N. Wood in Albany in 1884. For a number of years she and Mr. Wood made their home in Albany, later living for a time at Oroville, Calif., and in Nome, Alaska. In 1912 they returned to Albany and have resided here since. Mrs. Wood was a charter member of Alpha Temple No. 1, Pythian Sisters of Albany.

Pipe Line Bids To Be Opened

SILVERTON — Sealed bids will be opened Monday night at a special meeting of the Silverton city council when contracts will be awarded for the excavation and laying of the new wood-stave pipe in Silverton's Abiqua pipeline. Eight bids have been received and it is expected that others may yet be made.

The pipe to be replaced will run for a distance of somewhat under 2½ miles, it is understood. Replacement will be on Silverton's main water line and will carry the new pipe from the Abiqua to approximately three-fourths of a mile from the Morley Crossing. Termination will be at the Amundson farm.

The special meeting has been called for 8 p.m., according to Mayor Reber Allen.

Oswalds Observe Silver Wedding

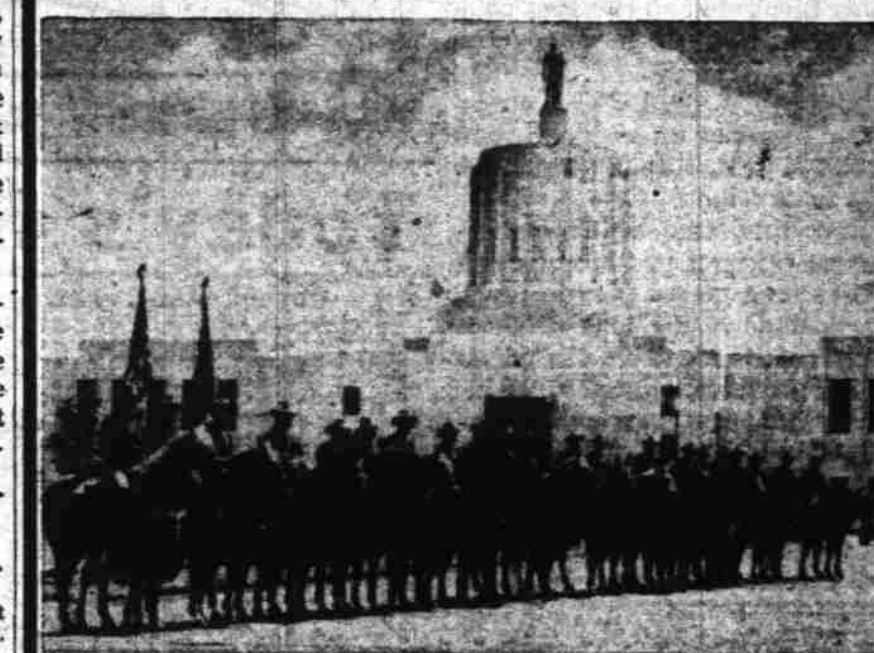
