Miss Clinton Plans Series Of Broadcasts

Miss Frances Clinton, home demonstration agent for Marion county, and a recognized authority on home food preservation, is to go on the air over a national radio network next Thursday, June 22. The broadcast, "Safety in Home Canning," will be over KOIN from Portland from 3:15 to 3:30 p. m. The program will be in the form of an interview with Miss Clinton, arranged by Sidney King, director of traffic safety division of the secretary of state's office in Salem. KSLM is to re-broadcast the program on Tuesday, June 27, from 11:15 to 11:30 a. m.

Food preservation demonstrations are to be given in Marion county by Miss Clinton during the coming week at St. Paul, Aumsville and Turner.

Monday, June 19, at St. Paul, a demonstration on proper methods of preparing foods for freezing will be held, beginning at 1:30 o'clock. Mrs. Carl Smith is making local arrangements, of the meeting which is to be held at the community hall.

Tuesday, June 20, from 7:15 to 7:30, Miss Clinton broadcasts her regular information to homemakers over KSLM Farm and Home program. At 2 p. m. Tuesday, a food preservation demonstration is to be given at Aumsville at the home of Mrs. Elmer Klein, who is making the local arrangements.

Wednesday, June 21, at the Turner schoolhouse at 2 p. m., the demonstration will be sponsored by the Sunshine club, with Mrs. Edith Mellis in charge. Thursday, June 22, Miss Clinton broadcasts over KOIN from 3:15 to 3:30 p. m.

The food preservation demonstrations are to assist any homemaker that is interested and the meetings are open to everyone.

Portland Scrap Iron Once Sent to Yawata

PORTLAND, June 17-(AP)—The bombing of Yawata, Japan's steel mill center, reminded Portlanders today that Yawata appeared frequently upon invoices of Japanese ships that loaded 663,000 tons of scrap iron here during the eight years preceding the war.

Japanese manifests also listed Osaka, Yokohama and Kobe as ports where the used railroad rails, old automobile parts and other scrap iron was to be unloaded.

PORTLAND, June 17-(AP)—Brig. Gen. Kenneth D. Wolfe, commander of the new 30th bomber air force, was reared in Portland and enlisted after receiving his diploma from Lincoln high school here. He has served in the air force since World War I.

Naval Group Wins May E, For Salem

Salem's "Victory Volunteer" campaign, which resulted in 88 17-year-old being signed up and sent to training station as a unit, enabled the capital city substation to win the "E" pennant for May performance.

Marshfield, by leading the way in radio technician and WAVE applicants, finished in second spot, just a whisker ahead of Eugene. Corvallis was fourth and Klamath Falls fifth.

A. C. Friesen and Mel Kennedy, both Sp (R) 1c, conceived the "Victory Volunteer" campaign and executed it with perfect efficiency. It was the largest group of volunteers to leave the state from one area since navy recruiting came under selective service in December, 1942.

Arrangements were made with the personnel officer, Camp Faragut, for this procedure by Lt. Comdr. John F. Bierler, officer in charge of the Portland main station. It was the first time that a group of naval trainees from any certain area was allowed to remain together throughout the entire training period. The "Victory Volunteer" company selected Jim Apple, Salem high graduate, as a recruit company commander.

Salem paid stirring tribute to the Volunteers, designating May 31 as "Victory Volunteer day" in their honor and feting them with dances, dinner and other social activities. Recruiter Friesen escorted the company to Camp Faragut, Idaho.

Transfers Due WU V-12 Men

Willamette university's V-12 navy program student body will be shifted to points all over the country this week when 95 men transfer to their new assignments. They go to 14 different schools and bases for further training. Dix Maxwell, student body president, continues his work at the Annapolis naval academy, and others go to UCLA, University of Washington, University of California school of dentistry, University of Minnesota and University of Wisconsin; also to Asbury Park, N.Y., Columbia, Cornell, Notre Dame and Northwestern.

One group of men will go to the supply school at Harvard. Another group will have a four-month training period in Washington, DC, before being enrolled at the Harvard supply school. The new campus recruits will arrive shortly after June 24.
