#### Food Prices Climb 1.8% in Portland

Food prices climbed 1.8 per cent in the month ending May 15 to bring Portland prices 50.6 higher than in the pre-war year of 1939. Fresh fruits and vegetablesanges, lettuce and apples-caused most of last month's increase, William A. Bedsoe, regionaal director of the U.S. bureau of labor statistics, reported.

# For Buying

Fewer persons will be eligible to buy new 1942 cars after June 23, Edmond W. Eggen, district OPA mileage rationing representative, announced Monday. The list of eligibles is being reduced because of the small number of new 1942 cars available for rationing, he explained.

Doctors, nurses, ministers, workers and others engaged in work essential to the war effort or to public health and safety are on the eligible list, Eggen said.

Highlights of the new rules: The car must be used principally for one or more of the purposes included in the eligibility list. Eligibility of persons who want

a 1942 car for driving four or school employes to or from school is revoked.

Eligibility is granted the United Service Organizations, Inc., upon certification of USO national headquarters that a car is needed in connection with travel on official business.


