ious specialists in the automotive field to determine the needs and specific information to be covered in this training program.

The class will be under the instruction of specialists who will be called in at definite periods during the instructional program to give pertinent to their special phase Speaker technical training and information

of automobile mechanics. This is a new system developed at Salem to give a better type of training in specialized occupations. Four men have been selected by the automobile trade who will carry the major portions of the training work, H. T. Smith, W. H. "Bill" Wilson, Joe Teel and Roland Traharne.

This will be a supplementary type of training for men now employed in automobile and truck mechanic's shops. Other persons who desire assistance in this type of work may also attend the class.
